MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs, crisp bacon, graham and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of tomato soup, croquettes, sweet potato salad, whole wheat bread and butter sandwiches, lemon pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Flounder in parsley sauce, twice baked potatoes, buttered spinach, jellied celery and cabbage salad, squash pie, milk, coffee.

Croquettes can be baked, pan fried or fried in deep fat but in any event they should be made from bread at least 24 hours old and cut in 1/2-inch cubes. If baked, toss cubes lightly in melted butter and bake in a moderate oven until a golden brown on all sides. If should take from five to eight minutes. If fried in deep fat, the fat must be very hot so that the bread will brown before soaking much fat. Panfried, the croquettes are shaken over the fire in a hot frying pan, pan-fried with butter.

Flounder in Parsley Sauce—Four good sized fillets of flounder, 1 tablespoon salt, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup fish stock, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons minced parsley.

The fish in croquettes and drop into a kettle of boiling water containing salt and vinegar. Watch carefully and as soon as the boiling point is reached after adding the fish, reduce temperature and simmer for 10 minutes. Drain and place on a hot platter. Four over sauce made as follows: melt butter, stir in flour and when bubbling slowly, slowly add milk and water in which fish was cooked, stirring constantly. Add salt, pepper and parsley and cook five minutes.

Willie Ritola Is Six-Mile Victor

NEW YORK, Nov. 26 (AP)—Willie Ritola, distance star of the Finnish-American A. C., outclassed a field of 80 today to win the national A. C. cross-country championship for the fifth time in six years. Ritola's time for the six-mile Van Cortlandt park course was 29 minutes 27 1/5 seconds, just one-fifth of a second slower than the course record set by him in 1925.

Bridge Pointers

FOR BEGINNERS

In these days of auction bridge popularity, members of each rising generation start to play with little, if any, knowledge of the game, and many who thought that bridge was a mind which would pass away, realize that it is a permanent feature of our social life and are anxious for beginner's information.

Starting today, my Saturday articles will be written for the needs of these bridge beginners. I will consider the game from the viewpoint of the novice so that any one absolutely unfamiliar with bridge or any other card game, may quickly and easily acquire a knowledge of bridge fundamentals and mechanics. Those who wish to follow the series should keep each one of these articles in a scrap book or elsewhere for ready reference.

The Game of Auction Bridge

Auction bridge is a game played by four players, two being partners playing against the other two as partners, with an ordinary pack of playing cards. Before play begins, the question of who shall be partners is determined by drawing cards. The draw is managed as follows: The entire pack is placed face down on the table and each player takes one card by lifting it from the pack and showing its face. If a player shows more than one card or take one of the four cards at either end of the pack, it is a misdraw and he must draw again. The two players drawing the two highest cards become partners, playing against the two drawing the two lowest cards. The respective values of the cards in the draw is the same as in the bidding and in the play; in each of the four suits, the Ace is the highest card, King next, Queen next, Jack next, Ten next, and so on down through the spot cards; the Deuce (Two) being the lowest.

As between the suits, the Spade is the highest, the Heart next, the Diamond next, and the Club lowest. When cards of the same denomination are drawn (i. e., two or more Sevens), the value of the respective suits determines which is high.

If the four players happened to draw the Ace of Spades, Jack of Hearts, Jack of Diamonds and Seven of Clubs, the holders of the Ace of Spades and the Jack of Hearts—the highest two cards—would become partners against the holders of the other two cards. The holder of the highest card (Ace of Spades) would be the first dealer and would have the choice of seats; and if, as is customary, two packs with different backs were used in the play, the choice between the two packs. The partner of the dealer—the player who drew the Jack of Hearts—would sit opposite the dealer. The opponent who drew the higher of the two lower cards (Jack of Diamonds) would have the choice of
