Gonzaga University Defeats Idaho — Drake Trims Southern Bears

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland (By The Associated Press)—Carnegie Tech of Pittsburgh and Oregon State Agricultural college battled to a 14 to 14 tie here Saturday before 16,000 spectators in the first inter-sectional game of the season in the northwest. The state college tied the score in the final period of the scintillating attack after the game had seemed hopelessly lost.

SPOKANE, Wash., (AP)—The 1927 football season ended in a blue blaze of glory for Gonzaga university here Saturday when the Bulldogs upset the dope and swamped the University of Idaho yardstick 13 to 9.

SAN FRANCISCO (By The Associated Press)—St. Mary's college defeated Santa Clara Saturday in their annual football tilt at Kezar stadium here by a score of 22 to 0. Fifteen thousand people saw the St. Mary's eleven score in all the first three periods and obtain a safety in the fourth.

COLLEGE, Los Angeles (By The Associated Press)—The football teams from Drake university, Des Moines, Iowa, and the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles, scrambled and fought on even terms for two periods Saturday, then the southern defense crumpled under the Iowa drive and Drake won 25 to 6.

The Bruins, who will graduate next season from the southern California conference to the faster company of the Pacific coast circuit, staked and lost on long passes.

Remus Loses A Point in Murder Trial Testimony

CINCINNATI, Nov. 28. (AP)—Independent evidence that George Remus' mind was diseased when he shot and killed his wife in Eden Park Oct. 6 last would be necessary before the defense could present opinions of lay witnesses or testimony concerning clues, Judge Chester H. Shook ruled in the territorial today.

The ruling came after an hour of heated arguments.

They started when Franklin Shaw, a liner of race horses

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at various tracks, was called by the defense. Preliminary questioning indicated that he was to tell of the actions of the slain woman at various places.

"The court feels that there has been a decidedly inconsistent position taken by the defense," asserted Judge Shook.

Rebels Fire on Marine Birdmen

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Nov. 28 (AP)—Aviators with the joint command of U. S. marine and national guardians operating near El Chipote were fired at by 200 rebels. The aviators flew low, dropped bombs, raked the rebels with machine gun fire, killed four of them and wounded several. The planes then returned safely to their base at Gotral.

Ship Workers in Riot at Canton

CANTON, China, Nov. 28. (AP)—Following the cutting off of food supplies by the government, ship workers engaged in the anti-British strike, rioted in the native quarter. Twenty or more fires were started, several bombs were thrown and numerous persons injured. Wholesale arrests by the military guard curbed the disturbance.

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
