New Call Money Rate In Street Causes Reaction

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Marking up of the call money rate from 3 1/2 to 4 per cent, the first change in about a month, turned the course of stock prices reactionary today after an earlier period of strength. Some of the liquidation probably was inspired by the first announcement of the new Ford car.

Standard Industrials and rails received fairly good support, losses generally being held to a point or two, but some of the volatile specialties cracked 3 to 6 points. Operators for the rise succeeded in marking up a few public utilities, farm implements and food shares.

Commercial Solvents, Abraham and Straus and H. W. Helm each broke about 5 points and International Rubber, Purity Baking B and Atlas Powder sold off 3 points or more.

The closing was weak. The late market was spent by heavy selling for an acute weakness of pivotal industrials and anxiety over the monetary situation call loans rising to 4 1/2 per cent, caused general unloading by traders. American Tobacco B and Russia Insurance broke 6 points and Radio and Allied Chemicals 5. Numerous other losses of 3 to 4 points embraced particular railroads and industrials. Total sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.
