Six Aviators Are Killed in Crash BIRMINGHAM, Nov. 28 (AP)— A dispatch to La Nacion from Tangier, Morocco, says that six French aviators were killed when their plane, one of a squadron of five, crashed in flames 40 miles from the town of Fez. The dispatch says the plane fell 2000 feet, wrapped in flames, and that the first, a lieutenant, a sergeant, three non-commissioned officers and a radio operator, were carried. They were buried today. The planes left Fez yesterday morning.
