PUTTING ROOF ON RECREATION HALL

Rapid Progress Is Being Made in Erection of New L. D. S. Building

Rapid progress toward completion is being made on the new L. D. S. Recreation hall, which is being erected on church property at the corner of Fourth street and N. avenue.

Workmen are now completing the roof of the structure and when this is finished, cold and disagreeable weather will not result in any halt inasmuch as interior work can be done despite the elements.

Much interest is being shown locally in the project. When completed the building will serve as a gymnasium, an armory for the national guard, a place for civic functions, besides for church purposes.

WALLOWA REPAIRS GYM

WALLOWA, Ore., Nov. 28.—Material for flooring the high school gymnasium with 13-16th hard wood maple has been received and will be laid as soon as the painting now being done on the interior is completed. It was announced this week.

The laying of the hardwood floor was first proposed by the high school alumni, who raised a fund this summer for the purpose by giving a play. While the amount was insufficient, the board of directors matched it with an amount sufficient to carry out the program.

The entire interior is being painted in white with the excep-

tion of a base around the side walls. When the work is all completed it will give the gymnasium an entirely new appearance.

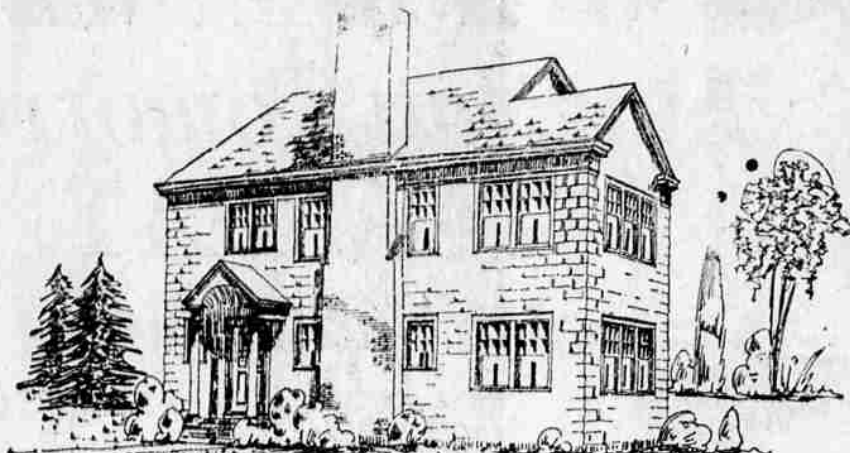

A FRAME COLONIAL

The design here shown is somewhat different, in plan as well as exterior, from the ordinary Colonial type homes. The entrance, instead of being in the center, is placed to one side, where one enters a small reception hall, with a wide archway opening into the living room. Here the dining room is placed in the rear, which gives the most privacy. The kitchen is good size, and has the separate breakfast alcove feature, as well as a rear entry for ice box, brooms, etc.

The kitchen is convenient to the front part of the house, and the basement stairs lead down under the main stairway.

On the second floor we find three medium size chambers. The front one having a fireplace, can be used as a second floor sitting room. A sleeping porch is located off this front bedroom, as well as an alcove, large enough for a child's crib, or this space can be used as a sewing room. The rooms are well lighted, with cross ventilation.

There is a full bathroom with the usual laundry, furnace room, storage and fruit room. In fact, everything is complete to make this a modern home.

The exterior is of frame construction, with wide shingles on the outside walls, green stained shingles on the roof, trim painted a white with green shutters. The massive front chimney is of the usual red Colonial brick, and a soldier course of brick is used to harmonize.

The trim throughout is of pine, painted, with the usual Colonial mahogany doors, stair treads, and rail, with white balusters. The walls are papered and the lighting fixtures a silver, in keeping with the true Colonial.

The cost, exclusive of heating and plumbing, is estimated at \$7,000 to \$8,500.

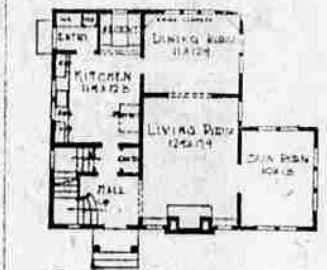
