WILSON'S VIEWS ON LIQUOR, POLITICS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29. (AP)—Political parties should be required to incorporate their attitudes on prohibition enforcement into their platforms for the coming campaign, Dr. Clarence True Wilson, general secretary of the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church said today at the annual meeting of the managers at the board.

No candidate for president or vice president should be permitted who is known to be unsympathetic with enforcement of the Volstead act, Dr. Wilson said.
