Goal Kicker Is Still Big Power In Grid Circles

CHICAGO (AP)—Victory and defeat still swing on the foot of the goal kicker, despite the football rules committee's efforts to reduce the number of one-point margins by setting the goal posts back ten yards.

Not so frequently this year as in previous years, have games been won and lost because some player missed a goal after touch-down and another did not, but many important battles have gone to the accurate toe.

In the Western conference, two games of one-point margins and one of a tied score changed the whole complexion of the race.

Minnesota's Atilla-like force of devastators, a pre-season favorite for the Big Ten banner, escaped a defeat at the hands of the disappointed Indiana Hoosiers after a goal had been missed only because a Hoosier was offside. The score was 14-14.

Northwestern watched its aspirations soar out of Dyche Stadium on the successful boot of an Illinois tackle, the Illini winning 7-6. Purdue with its "Pest" Welch and a win over Harvard, lost to Chicago by the margin of a goal after touch-down, each team having been able to cross the other's goal line once.

Missouri Valley fortunes swung Columbia-ward when Missouri made good a goal and Nebraska missed, the score 7-6. West Virginia twice this year was tied, because its opponent also missed a goal and again when each kicked the extra point. Yale's eye for the cross bars was the measure of the Blue's superiority over the Army. Each scored a touchdown and Yale the point after and a field goal.

The Oregon Aggies on the Pacific coast missed two goals and Southern California made on to win 12-12, and a week later both Southern California and Stanford missed one and made one to tie at 13.

Missouri Loses Two Stars Due To Graduation

COLUMBIA, Mo., (AP)—The two leaders of Missouri's famous aerial offensive flashed in the Missouri Valley conference for the last time this fall.

Captain George Flamank, 200-pound fullback and an unending forward pass hurler, and Ivet Clark, quarterback, who weighs 150 pounds, have played their last year at the University of Missouri.

They were hampered this year by injuries, but in a pinch they have limped into crucial games and snatched victory for their teammates.

In the Nebraska game, with Missouri trailing 6-0, the pair hobbled onto the field. With Flamank hurling passes into the arms of Clark, the score was evened, and a placement goal kick turned the tide to victory. Then they limped back to the bench.

In his three years of varsity football, Clark scored four touch-downs which gave Missouri its first record of three successive wins over the powerful Nebraska team.
