Stock Exchange Trade Resumes Upward Course

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—Resumption of the upward price movement in today's stock market coincided with the lowering of call money rates from 4 1/2 to 4 per cent. Violent advances of 5 to 17 points took place in some of the high priced specialties, while many of the rail and industrial leaders moved up a point or two.

Speculative interest centered largely in shares of auto accessories, steel and other companies likely to benefit from Henry Ford's business. Midland Steel Products preferred, which is understood to have an order for auto frames, soared 17 points to 22 1/2, or more than double the year's low of 10 1/2. Stewart Warner Speedometer moved up more than 4 points to a new top, and there was a brisk demand for Thimble Roller Bearing and Briggs Body, other reported recipients of Ford orders.

U. S. Steel common, which sold down to 144 yesterday, crossed 147 today and General Motors crossed 127, after showing splendid resistance to selling pressure just above 125. New 1927 peak prices were recorded by Radio Corporation, American Bank Note, Green Chemicals, American Republics, Montgomery Ward, New York Dock and about a dozen others.

Pacific Coast first preferred, which ordinarily changes hands in odd lots, jumped 45 points; Warren Bros. S. and Hestia Insurance, Commercial Solvents, Houston Oil, American Tobacco, International Harvester and several others sold 4 to 7 points higher. Mack Trucks climbed nearly 4 points by early afternoon.

The closing was strong. National Biscuit moved up seven points to a record peak. Total sales approximated 2,600,000 shares.

EGG PRICES IN DOWNWARD TREND

Extras Take Largest Drop, Receding 3 Cents—Firsts Down a Cent

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29 (AP)—Continuing the downward movement which started last week, egg prices on the local produce market eased a bit further at the daily exchange meeting yesterday afternoon when the prices on extras and firsts were reduced. Extras took the largest drop, receding 3¢ to 40¢, while firsts dropped from 27 to 26¢. Other grades remained unchanged, mediums at 24¢ and underbreds at 20¢. Association prices are: Extras 42¢; firsts 28¢; mediums 26¢; underbreds 22¢.

Further drop in egg prices may be expected, according to local dealers, until the peak of the winter lay in March.

Butter prices are firm, with all grades up a cent except firsts, which are quoted 1/2¢ higher than yesterday. The strengthening in the market is the result of subnormal production and the gradual decrease of the storage supply.

Following a strengthening of the North Portland stockyards prices yesterday, country dressed meats are a trifle firmer on the local market this morning. Choice veal is up from 1/2 to 3¢, the best bringing 1 1/2¢ while light hogs are stronger at 13 1/2¢. Little change is noted in the poultry market, which has been decidedly irregular since early last week due to the abnormal receipts and small demand. Poultry dealers are quoting prices over a wide range on most classes of birds, though the market on fancy and choice fowls is fairly steady.

The fruit and vegetable market is firm in most classes of produce today with only trifling changes in quotations.

Potato prices are steady as are apples and root crops.

Wheat Heavy And Lower At Close
CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (AP)—Opening at 1/2 to 1¢ decline, Chicago wheat subsequently showed some further setback. Corn, oats and provisions were also easier; corn starting at 1/2 to 1¢ off and falling to hold rallies.

Wheat closed heavy, 1/2 to 1¢ net lower; corn 1/4 to 1/2¢ off; oats unchanged to 1/2¢ up, and provisions varying from 2¢ decline to a rise of 2¢.

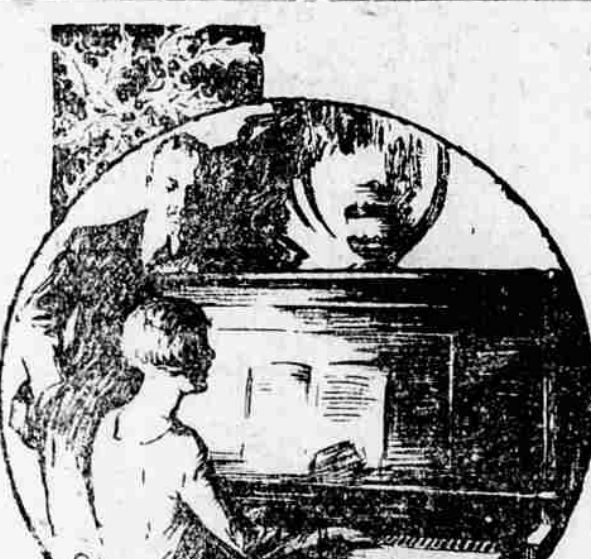
