Right to Regulate Milk Sales Upheld

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 29 (AP)—The right of the city of Portland to inspect milk producing establishments even though located outside the city, and its right to regulate the sale in the city are upheld by the state supreme court.

An opinion by the court as a whole affirms Judge George Rossman of the lower court for Multnomah county in the cases of Paul Korth, appellant, against the city and J. Georgeson, appellant, against the city.
