FURNITURE GONE; REMUS IS DAZED

So Testifies Former Counsel for Defendant in Ohio Murder Trial

CINCINNATI, Nov. 30 (AP)—Removal of the furniture from George Remus' mansion here, cited by one witness as the thing which sent Remus off on an insane tangent which ended in the slaying of his estranged wife, was said by another witness today in the Remus murder trial to have been done while the defendant was in personal charge of his property.

William Mueller, for eight years caretaker-walshman at the Remus show place, admitted under cross examination by Charles P. Taft II, county prosecutor, that the expensive furnishing and statuary were sent away while he was on a three weeks' vacation. Remus had charge of the property at the time, Mueller added.

Benton S. Oppenheimer, a former judge of the superior court and formerly counsel for Remus in the divorce suit pending when Remus last October shot and killed his wife, yesterday traced Remus' alleged insanity to the time Remus discovered that his mansion had been stripped.

Oppenheimer described how Remus wandered apparently dazed from room to room of his 31-room house. Remus wrung his hands, wept and uttered cries of amazement that his wife could have treated him in that manner while he served a penitentiary sentence for violation of the prohibition law. Mueller admitted that some of his testimony of yesterday concerning things the defense pleads drove Remus insane had not been relayed to Remus.

Mueller said he had seen Franklin L. Dodge Jr., three times at the Remus home and that twice he was driving Remus' automobile.

SQUATTER TO BE TAKEN BY U. S. OFFICERS

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—U. S. Deputy Marshal A. E. Cochran, of Portland, and Forest Ranger Hugh Ritter, of the Umpqua national forest service left this morning over the Umpqua trail to arrest a squatter, C. W. Nichols who has taken up a claim adjoining those of M. Roy Davis and E. H. Best, who are serving sentences for contempt of court after failing to obey the order of the federal court to vacate their claims. Nichols is charged with trespassing and a bench warrant was issued for his arrest by the federal court at Portland.

Nichols, according to information obtained at the local forest service headquarters, took up his claim in the late summer and refused to obey orders issued by forest service officers to vacate. A complaint charging trespass was sworn out in the federal court from which the warrant of arrest was issued. He has constructed a cabin, according to the information given by the forest service officials, and he and his wife are living on the claim.

The trip to Fish creek desert will be made over the Umpqua trail by pack train and will probably require two or more days.

Government To Take a Hand in Chicago Battles

CHICAGO, Nov. 30 (AP)—Carroll Fero's death, believed to have been due to gang rivalry, has brought the federal government into the investigation of Chicago's gangland warfare.

Fero whose body was found early yesterday beside a road in Bensenville, was known as an imitable energetic manufacturer. The United States district attorney's office, however, has revealed that Fero and six others were to have appeared for trial in federal court next Monday on charges of violating the prohibition law.

The government was prepared to present evidence showing Fero to be the head of a large band of moonshiners. The district attorney's office today advanced the theory that Fero was slain to prevent his giving evidence damaging to the others involved in the manufacture of alcohol.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—A miner's daughter in Frackville, Pa., in a letter to the New York American today offers to marry any one who will give \$5000 to her debilitated father to keep him from losing his home.

"I am a girl of 19 years," the letter begins. "I work in a factory to help my parents who are in debt up to their necks. My father is a miner. He works hard, but he does not get enough to feed and clothe his family. He owes for the house. He owes for food."

"So I want to know if you can't help me out," the letter continues. "By that I mean to put an ad in the paper and say I will marry any man for \$5000 to save my parents from being thrown out of house and home. I am the oldest of eight children, and I'll willingly sacrifice myself for that amount just to save them from ruin. My right name and address is Miss Mary Lumska, 1014 Lino street, Frackville, Penn."

Negro Lynched And Burned in Kentucky

JENKINS, Ky., Nov. 30 (AP)—Searing flames mourning from the top of Cumberland mountains signalled the death of Leonard Woods, negro, who was lynched by a mob of more than 200 armed men early today.

Woods, arrested for the slaying of Marshall Deaton, 35, mine foreman, for the Elkton Coal corporation at Fleming, Ky., was shot to death as he faced a half circle of rifles. Then his body was burned.

between the Russian viewpoint and that of the other nations was not in its aim, but in its method of approach to the problem.

The delegates to the conference left the conference hall in earnest discussion of the soviet plan which one called a "peace bomb." Another remarked that the scheme goes further than the project for the outlawry of war which Senator Borah and other Americans have been advocating.

The delegates also attached importance to one of Lippinoff's subsequent utterances that if the soviet scheme were found too revolutionary, the Russians would be ready to participate in any more modest plan of disarmament when anything practical was proposed.

been illegal and without adequate approval.

In addition to the documentary evidence a few witnesses were heard briefly. The only clash came when Mr. Terrill offered evidence regarding the dismantling of the Cove line, which Commissioner H. H. Corey held was entirely irrelevant to the question of whether public necessity and convenience justified the allowance of the petition covering the present and the future railroad junction.

The attorneys in the case will submit briefs and the Oregon commission will then send the record to Washington with its recommendations.

Surveying For Longview Span

LONGVIEW, Wash., Nov. 30 (AP)—A crew of five surveyors under the direction of Dan Walsh, engineer, today began staking a center line and base lines on both sides of the Columbia here for the projected Longview-Rainier interstate bridge. The beginning of the survey was taken as a conclusive indication that Wesley Vandercreek, Longview and W. D. Comer, Seattle, the bridge's promoters, are ready to proceed with the \$5,000,000 structure under a permit recently approved by a cabinet committee in Washington, D. C., after a prolonged controversy between southwest Washington and northwest Oregon and Portland.

The lines being run will be used for triangulation to locate the piers.

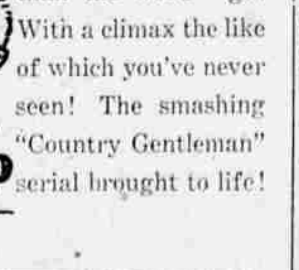
