POULTRY PRICES ARE WEAKENING

Heavy Receipts Is Cause; Potatoes Steady, quoted at \$1.50 to \$2.00

PORTLAND, Nov. 30. (AP)—Increasingly heavy receipts of poultry by local wholesale dealers had a tendency to weaken the market here somewhat today. Changes in prices are small, however, and the demand continues light for all classes of fowl. Retail quotations today are as follows: Heavy broilers 21c; medium 18c; light 15c; fryers 20c and broilers 25c. In other divisions of the poultry market prices are steady with a weak undertone.

Following a decided drop in prices yesterday, eggs are down a little lower today. Firsts are down 15c on the dairy exchange board to 35 1/2c while current receipts are a cent lower than yesterday at 32c. Other grades are steady but the undertone of the market is decidedly weak and further recession in prices are probable before the end of the week. Association prices are unchanged.

Butter prices are steady with receipts somewhat less than deliveries.

Country dressed meats are firm, veal holding steady around 14 1/2c and light hogs about 13c.

Oregon yellow Danvers onions are up a little today, the best selling at \$1.85 on the local wholesale market. Other grades range down to \$1.60.

Potato prices are fairly steady with the quality of the receipts daily growing better. Exceptionally fine Deschutes valley tubers are being received and are selling at \$1.75 to \$1.85. Other Oregon and Washington Netted Gems are going for between \$1.50 and \$2.

OREGON LAND IS SEEDED BY PLANE

1200-Acre Range Near Roseburg Being Closely Watched by Farmers

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 30. (AP)—An inspection of the 1200-acre range owned by the Coquille Valley Sheep and Wool company, located near Coquille in Coos county, which was recently seeded from an airplane by N. W. Perkins and H. R. Adams, local aviators, has disclosed that the seed distribution was almost perfect and that the stand of grass is far better than had been anticipated, according to a report received today by the fliers from G. Earl Low, of Coquille, secretary of the company. This is believed was the biggest airplane seeding contract ever undertaken in the world and the outcome is being very closely watched by Southern Oregon stockmen and forest officials as it is possible that airplane seeding offers an opportunity to restore overgrazed lands to usefulness as well as affording a means of creating new range in burned over lands.

The tract seeded a few weeks ago was a part of a 1300-acre tract of logged over land. The tract, accessible only by trail, is rough and filled with burned over logs, stumps, snags, etc., making hand seeding a very difficult, uncertain and costly proceeding. It was decided to attempt the task of seeding the tract with range grass by means of airplane and the local aviators, by means of a specially constructed hopper, scattered about 4000 pounds of seed in ten hours and 45 minutes of flying time, making 24 trips. The seed used was less than one-half the amount that would have been required in hand sowing. The cost per acre amounted to 50c by the airplane method as compared with a cost of from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per acre estimated for hand sowing.

While the seed was being scattered from the airplane, flying at an elevation of from four to six hundred feet, a ground inspector checked the distribution. Another inspection was made this week, according to the report and it was found that the grass has attained a good growth and that every portion of the range was covered evenly and that no bare spots exist.

If this experiment works out successfully, as it now appears that it will, stockmen say that it will be possible to reclaim thousands of acres of logged over and burned over lands in Southern and Western Oregon and make the lands useful for sheep and cattle range.

Violent Bidding Turns Course of Some Stocks Up

NEW YORK, Nov. 30. (AP)—Violent bidding for special stocks sent more than a score of issues to new high records in today's stock market, with gains running from 1 to 7 points. So great was the volume of trading that the ticker fell 22 minutes behind the market by early afternoon, causing widespread confusion in brokerage houses and bringing about considerable irregularity in prices. Trading averaged more than 500,000 shares an hour in the first three hours. Heavy selling of 1920-American B and American Republics brought about sympathetic selling of the other oils.

General Motors and U. S. Steel common were sluggish most of the session. Radio touched a new high just under \$100 a share and then jumped 7 points to a new top; Warren Bros., nearly 6 and Rossa Insurance, Electric Storage Battery and Montgomery Ward advanced 4 points or more. The list of new highs included Scaup Roebuck, Goodrich Rubber, Stewart Warner, Abitibi Power, Corn Products and National Biscuit.

The closing was strong. The best prices of the day were obtained for many stocks in the final hour when Commercial Solvent soared 10 points; Montgomery Ward, Canadian Pacific and National Distillers products 6 to 6 1/2 and Peoples Gas, Dupont and American Radiator 4 to 5. Total sales approximated 2,800,000 shares.
