A chance to charge one's "laughing batteries" is given to those who see "Her Father Said No," which is now showing at the Colonial theater today and Friday.

The picture was made to be a laugh fest and has more than lived up to the purpose of its creation.

The story was written by H. C. Witwer whose genius for depicting the humorous side of life is well known.

The adaptation was made by Al Boasberg whose flair for comedy has brought to the screen some of its choicest moments of mirth.

With this unrivaled team supplying such rich material, Director Jack McKeown may be credited for having transplanted it to the silver sheet in a very thorough and logical fashion.

The various delightful roles were entrusted to experts who have made each part a distinctive gem of entertainment.

Mary Brian is the charming heiress who falls in love with the ex-prize fighter, played by Danny Ogden.

The two Merchants of Mirth, Al Cooke and Kil Guard are also featured, and are responsible for a great number of gales and hurricanes of laughter.

Zane Grey's "Open Range" at Star Theater

Characterization in most Western pictures seems to be cast in a common mold. There's always a handsome, up-standing hero; a pretty, old-fashioned girl and a dastardly villain.

"Open Range," which is opening at the Star theater today for a three day run seems to be the exception. Here is a story from the pen of Zane Grey that is unique in that its central characters act like human beings. And moreover, it is probably the most thrilling picture ever made from a Zane Grey novel.

The picture is interesting, too, because of the cast. It is the first chance we have had of seeing Lane Chandler, whom Paramount is hailing as its newest screen discovery. He merits their enthusiasm. Chandler is a big, good-looking lad who looks like a cowboy and not like an actor in chaps.

Then there is Betty Bronson in child roles. She is the girl who became famous overnight as the screen "Peter Pan." This is her first Western and she easily proves in it that Barrie's whimsical story is not the only type of role of which she is fitted.

In "Open Range" Betty performs convincingly as a pretty girl of the frontier. Fred Kohler, known as "the wolf of the screen" is the villain. He is such a "bad 'un" in "Open Range" that this reviewer had to suppress a feeling of friendliness for a man who could be so altogether sinful.

The big punch in the picture comes in the last reel. Indians attack the town of Marva, where lives the heroine, and they are driven out only when the hero stampedes a herd of cattle into the town.

Clifford Smith has done a workmanlike piece of direction, and the scenario by John Stone and J. Walter Ruben has gotten the best values from the book.

Hal Roach's latest M-G-M "Our Gang" comedy, also showing at the Star theater, is well named. It packs a wallop in each fist. There is that rare combination of story value, real comedy and hair-raising thrills which makes for real entertainment. The action takes

"Two Arabian Knights" Opens At Arcade

Has the mantle of the beloved Wally Reid fallen on William Hoyd, as some critics seem to think? His latest picture, "Two Arabian Knights," at the Arcade theater today, Friday and Saturday, shows him in the type of part that the great "Wally" would have loved to play.

Picture experts see in Hoyd a return to the American, Nordic type of star, displaced for the past few years by popularity of Latin leading men. Hoyd has a twinkling eye and a devil-may-care smile. His film history alone is distinctly an American story of success, too, because it was only after years of struggle and disappointment that he attained the heights.

Despite his wealth of experience, this comedy-drama of two soldiers at the close of the war and what happens to them, is really Hoyd's first effort in a film production dealing with hilarious situations almost exclusively. The dramatic moments in "Two Arabian Knights" are employed to make amusing incidents funnier by contrast.

Boyd's role in the film is the part of a rich young private of infantry, who like all privates, hates his top sergeant. How those two characters are thrown together, and how they indulge in a series of personal fights until dangerous circumstances compel them to be buddies, are part of the story, which serves to give Boyd a heroic character as well as one the spectators may laugh with throughout the swiftly-moving film.

Louis Wolheim plays the sergeant. He was the original Captain Plagg of "What Price Glory" when it opened on the stage in New York.

Mary Astor, leading lady for Douglas Fairbanks in "Don Q," takes the part opposite Boyd, the role of the daughter of an Arab chieftain, who is unwittingly the cause of most of the doughboys' troubles. The story leaves out the year after the opening sequences, later the pair escape from an enemy prison camp in Arab garb and they are helpless to prevent a journey to Arabia. The conflicts they get into, fighting each other when there is no one else to fight, clashing with the Arab gladiators and his minions, and other exciting sequences, form a background for typical American humor.

The picture was made by Caddo Productions, a new United Artists unit headed by Howard Hughes. John W. Conadine Jr., supervised the picture, which was directed by Lewis Milestone.
