SOUTHERN TEAMS PLAY FOR TITLE

Georgia University and Georgia Tech to Tangle in Atlanta on Dec. 3

By Horace Henegar (Associated Press Sports Editor) ATLANTA, Ga., (AP)—Two of the South's greatest football teams—Georgia and Georgia Tech—will meet here Dec. 3 in a game that will decide the Dixie gridiron supremacy and make or break the Bulldogs' chances for the national collegiate title.

Riding high on the crest of victories over all opponents, including Yale, Virginia, Florida, Tulane and Alabama, Georgia faces the fiercest test of the year many predict because of the traditional right which always marks Bulldog-Tornado games.

In addition, the Bulldogs will go up against a Tornado eleven that has had but two touchdowns scored upon it in the South this season—a team that has bowed only to Notre Dame.

To analyze backfield strength of the two squads, shows Georgia Tech has two of the most versatile sophomore backfield men in Dixie in Warner Mizell and Stumpy Thomason, halfbacks. Both kick, run and pass.

Georgia has Herdis McTerry, "the red specter" of the Southern gridiron, who is leading the Southern Conference in points scored in conference games. This great player, it has the so-called "thousand backs" who have doted out misery to all opponents so far. This pseudonym was applied to the Georgia secondary because of the many backs, each apparently the equal of the other.

As for the lines, both teams have a veteran forward wall. Georgia boasts a Jack Shaver and Tom Scott as two of the outstanding ends of the country. Gene Smith, guard, is touted as one of the greatest in that position that Dixie has had in its gridiron history. In addition to these, it has Lautzenhiser, Morris and Roland, all experiencing a good year.

Hood, Drennon, Crowley and Martin, experienced men of previous years, have proved of prime importance in the victories turned in by Georgia Tech.

The game will attract the largest sports gathering in the South this year, some 35,000 tickets—all available—having been sold.

Since athletic relations were resumed two years ago between the two institutions, each has won one game. The Golden Tornado won in 1925, 3 to 6. Georgia won last season, 14 to 13. If Tech should defeat the Bulldogs it would have a good claim to the Southern conference title.

Purple Tornado En Route Today To Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1 (AP)—University of Washington's purple tornado, which left Seattle last night and will arrive here tomorrow, has named Coach Howard John of the University of Southern California to break up his football defensive unbalanced line formation of six men on the forward wall. The S. C. mentor with the powerful off-attack drive of Louie Tercan and Captain Pat Wilson in mind, has been instructing his guards in the art of taking a firm stance when on the defense, and instead of six forwards, will have seven men in the front line.

Shelving, regular guard, who probably will be out of next Saturday's game because of the pounding he received in the Notre Dame game, will be replaced by Cecil Holt.

The Southern California offense as well as defense will be changed to combat the invaders.

An open and varied attack with a more than usual resort to the air is being prepared for the northerners.

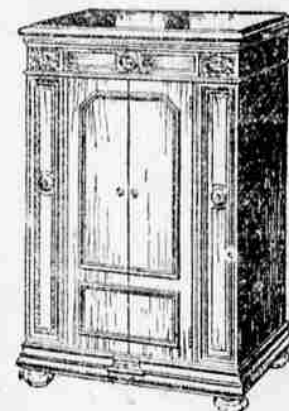
