MENUS

BREAKFAST — Orange juice, cereal, cream, creamed dried beef, onion toast, granola and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON — Macaroni and chicken, ramikins, lettuce sandwiches, prune whip with custard sauce, milk, tea.

DINNER — Lamb stew, baked squash, endive salad, apple tapioca pudding, milk, coffee.
The ramikins suggested in the luncheon menu use up any chicken that may have been left from the roast chicken served two dinners before. This time of year a left-over can often be kept until the third day, making it seem much less like a left-over.

Macaroni and Chicken Ramikins — One-half cup broken macaroni, 2 to 1 cup cooked chicken, 1 egg, 2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoon paprika, 2-3 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon parsley salt.

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and rinse in cold water. Drain. Chop with the chicken in chopping bowl. Beat egg until very light with salt, paprika and milk. Add macaroni and chicken and parsley salt and mix thoroughly. Turn into buttered ramikins. Place the molds on several thicknesses of paper in a dripping pan. Stir round with boiling water, cover with buttered paper and bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. The timbales should be firm to the touch in the center when done. Unmold on a large hot platter and pour over a rich tomato sauce or cheese sauce. Use a stock made from the bones of the chicken for the liquid in either sauce.

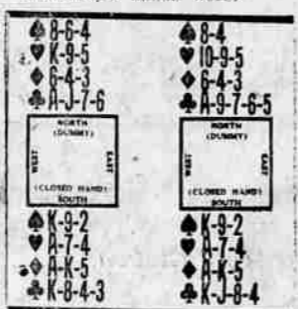

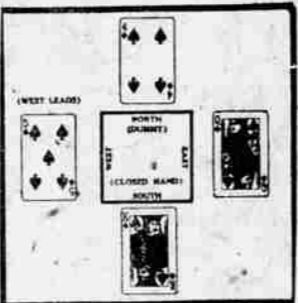
Bridge Pointers

To finesse or not to finesse, a troublesome bridge question, is our topic this week. Yesterday's hands were:



In both hands South (Closed Hand) is playing a No Trump; the adversaries have not bid. The play to trick 1 is:



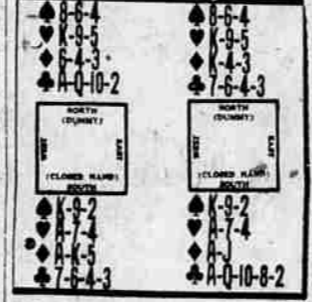
To trick 2, South (Closed Hand) should lead a Club. The question in such case is: How should Declarer plan to handle the Club suit?

The Answers
No. 5. Declarer has eight Clubs in his two hands, so a finesse is advisable. Not having the Ten in either hand, there is only one way to finesse, viz., by leading low from Closed Hand toward Dummy; but instead of trying the finesse on trick 2, South should lead the King of Clubs so that if East hold the singleton Queen it would be captured. If each adversary play a small Club, South should lead another Club and if West play a small Club, should finesse the Jack.

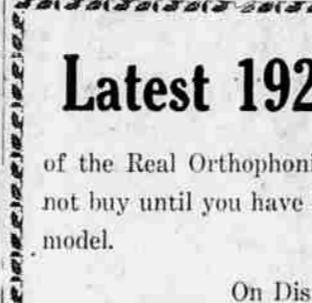
No. 6 varies from No. 5 in having Ace facing King-Jack instead of Ace-Jack facing King. The strength of these two suits being the same, they would be managed

similarly if they were of the same length; but in No. 6 Declarer has nine Clubs, in No. 5 only eight. With nine a finesse to catch a Queen is inadvisable. In No. 6 lead small, playing Ace from Dummy. That would ensure very Club trick if a singleton Queen were held in either hand. If both West and East play small, lead Five of Clubs from Dummy and, if East again play small, do not finesse; try to drop the Queen upon the theory that four adverse cards are apt to be divided 2-2.
