Street Work—

Attended Canadian Hearing—
Mr. Carter, commissioner of reclamation, of Idaho, and Mr. Paulson, district engineer of the United States geological survey of Idaho, passed through here this morning on their way home to Boise from Nelson, B. C., where they attended joint commission. The hearing was held for the application of the Creston Reclamation company to construct dyking works on the Kootenai river. As a result of a statement filed by the secretary of state ordering a continuation, a year's further investigation will be made before the application is answered. Ex-Senator Clark, of Wyo., was also on train No. 24 this morning en route home from Nelson where he attended the hearing but remained in Spokane for a short visit before returning to Idaho. "There is a lot of building being done in Boise," said Mr. Carter this morning. "In many places throughout the city's streets one sees evidence of building and growth. Boise is making a new start," he continued. Speaking of the Kootenai river project, Engineer Paulson declared he has found a new application of the old adage, "when in Rome do as the Romans do." "In Idaho, we spelled Kootenai with an 'i' but in Canada we learned to spell it with a 'y'."

U. S. ECONOMIC PROGRESS IN YEAR GREAT

The foundation of the rich resources of the country, not taxed by an excessive population, and the energy, intelligence and attitude toward work of the producing population.

"In our earlier days advance was in considerable measure attributable to the opening of new resources, but during the past quarter century this has not been a major influence. The principal factors. One of the most profound modern tendencies is the swiftly expanding use of electric current."

16 Per Cent of Total
For the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, Dr. Julius Klein, its chief, pointed out that American foreign trade today represented 16 per cent of the world's total commerce, whereas in 1913 it represented only 11 per cent. He predicted that "manufactured goods will continue to gain in relative importance in our export trade," while the growth of population at home will "continue to call for the consumption of a larger and larger proportion of foodstuffs and raw materials produced by our farms."

He forecast vigorous competition for foreign trade in the future, but predicted that with proper effort on the part of American business men, "we shall be able to maintain our share of the steadily expanding world commerce."

League of nations system of guarantees was absolutely inadequate.

League Protection Bill
M. Markovitch recalled that Albanian independence has been solemnly guaranteed by the great powers and that Albania, as a member of the league, also was likewise guaranteed territorial integrity, yet Albania felt that her national security was so feeble that she believed it imperative to have recourse to special alliances with Italy, France, and England.

Apparently, declared M. Markovitch, neither Albania nor Italy deemed league protection sufficient.

Wool Report
BOSTON, Dec. 2 (AP) — The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There is wider interest in wool on the part of mills and some further sizeable transactions in territory and Texas wools and the half-blood grade have been especially prominent in the sale, with a tendency for prices to rise."

"Several large operators have started contracting in the west, mostly in Utah, at close to eastern market parity."

"Foreign markets are all strong and against the buyers. A shipping strike has tied up Geelong and Melbourne sales and may spread to all Australia."

"Mohair has been fairly active and prices are ruling rather firmer."
