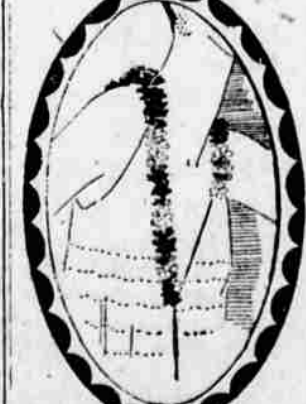

## Bridge Pointers

Today's article, like last Saturday's is devoted to the needs of the Bridge beginner. These articles will consider the game from the viewpoint of the novice, and will enable any one unfamiliar with Bridge or any other card game to acquire a knowledge of Bridge fundamentals and mechanics quickly and easily. Those who wish to follow this series should keep all the Saturday articles for ready reference, and should not skip a single Saturday. If you did not see last Saturday's introductory article, get it if possible.

## THE GAME OF AUCTION BRIDGE

**Shuffle, Cut and Deal**

The play is started by the player on the left of the Dealer who shuffles the pack selected by the Dealer. All players have the right to shuffle, the Dealer having the right to shuffle last.

After the shuffle, the Dealer places the pack he is about to deal before the opponent who is sitting on his right. That player lifts off the top portion and places it, by the bottom portion, toward the Dealer, who then places the bottom portion on top of what had been the top portion, and that constitutes the cut. In making the cut, four or more cards must be left in each portion, if fewer than four cards are left, or if any card be faced or displaced during the cut, there must be a new cut.

After the cut is completed, the Dealer distributes the fifty-two cards one at a time face down; first to the opponent on his left, second to Dealer's partner, third to the right hand opponent, last to himself, and so on until the entire pack is dealt, the last card going to the Dealer. There must be a new deal by the same Dealer with the same pack if the cards are not properly dealt to the four players in four distinct packets of thirteen cards each; or if, during the deal, any card be found faced in the pack; or if the pack be held below the table during any part of the deal. While the deal is in progress the partner of the Dealer shuffles the other ("still") pack; and places it on his right (on the left of the adversary who is to deal next) where it must be left undisturbed until the next dealer picks it up to be cut.

Who becomes the Declarer, and how the trump-suit is selected will be described next Saturday. If any point in my explanation of how Bridge is played is not perfectly clear to any reader, I hope he will write, sending a return envelope, asking me concerning the subject upon which he is in doubt. ## Parisian Invents 'Fool-Proof' Rouge

PARIS (AP) — "Fool-proof" rouge that may be dabbed on in large spots without hurting the eyes of aesthetic observers is the newest Parisian contribution to woman's joy.

It is "ideal for beginners," says Lucien Lelong, the discoverer. He gained fame by his theory of the "symphony of motion," which boiled down, means designing dresses that hang well on a live woman walking instead of draping nicely on a mannequin.

There is a whole new "vibrant shord" on Lelong's palette. He has evolved a science or a philosophy of lip and face adornment that is described with all the elaborate imagery that lifts "the commerce of rouge out of mere trade and elevates it into heights of art and poetry."

Rouge, in this realm of manufactured beauty-in-a-box, must be nicely chosen by woman to harmonize with her "age, fringe, type, profile and costume." Rouge, also is not "put on" but is "worn."

There are eight rouges and day rouges. There are shades for a blonde with a straight nose and a brunette with short hair and a light gown. It is all quite complicated.

The fool-proof varieties are "rouge re soif" which "can rarely be overused" and "rose coral" for the "careless woman" for it is "seldom abrasive even when applied indiscriminately."

There are "more sophisticated" colors that must be "worn" artistically to avoid "that hard artificial appearance."
