## Marine Birdmen Start Flight To Nicaraguan City

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 3. (AP)—Major E. H. Brainard, commander of the United States marine corps aviation forces, Sergeant M. T. Shepard, pilot, and Corporal W. M. Winchester, mechanic, hopped off at 6:22 o'clock eastern standard time this morning on a non-stop flight to flight to Nicaragua. They planned to deliver their tri-motored Packer monoplane to marine corps officers there for service with the American troops.

Flying conditions were announced "perfect" for the flight when the plane left the long runway after using most of its four thousand feet before clearing. "High ceiling," good visibility and almost no wind had been reported (prevalent over the route by the tropical radio station at Tolu, Honduras, over which E. W. Lazelle, chemist at Portland, at Enterprise last evening, Mr. Lazelle came on to La Grande last night and went from here to Portland.

Havana was his immediate objective, his monoplane being due over the Cuban city in two hours after leaving Miami. Major Brainard was at the controls when the hop off was made. His preliminary figures had calculated ten hours for the jump to Managua. The flight was routed southward from Honduras, over which point the major's calculations told him they should be at about 2 o'clock this afternoon.

## Enterprise People Hauling Wood From Nearby Forests For Fuel

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Dec. 3.—Gathering wood for fuel in the forest at the north has become a pastime for some residents of town and a serious business for many others. All because the East Oregon Lumber company has curtailed operations for several months, according to the Enterprise Record-Observer. The usual supply of sawwood, the chief dependence of town for fuel, has been lacking, and many men have had sufficient spare time to cut out and "roast" wood for the winter.

Fortunately the north highway traverses the national forest for many miles and there is a profusion of dead wood, both from man and from fallen trees. These are scattered all through the forest, and many are in easy reach of the highway.

Perhaps two months ago men began cutting this dead wood for fuel on a commercial scale and hauling it in town on trucks. They have done a large and steady business and their fuel has been very welcome.

More recently many individuals have taken up the matter of gathering their own fuel, and their operations have been picturesque and strange. They use family automobiles and trailers if they have no trucks and make several trips a day, generally bringing in logs not more than four feet long. A new-fangled touring car was observed last week cutting into town, the back seat space piled with all manner of wood. Trailers are in demand and are hooked on behind pleasure cars and both are loaded, logs are pressed into service and

logs, limbs and chunks are piled within, and stacked on the running board and leaders.

CHICKENS PICKED  
Now by Machinery

LONDON (AP)—Picking a chicken has become an easy in England as cutting off a log. It is now done by machinery—one chicken a minute.

The feathers are plucked entirely by machine, pin feathers and all. The inventor of the device is Lieut. Gen. J. B. Kingdon who, upon retiring from the royal navy, became a poultry farmer.

The machine is L-shaped, the feathers are drawn into it by suction and stuffed neatly into a collecting bag. The fan makes about 500 revolutions for a young chicken but 700 or 800 are required to strip a tough old hen or rooster.
