First M. E. Church.—"Christmas in a Frontier Parsonage" is the title of the play to be given at the Methodist church, which is under the direction of Mrs. H. W. Parker. The principal characters in the play are Mrs. Goodhue, Miss Mary Lou Piper, her college friend, Miss Mary Culp, Mrs. Thompson, Mildred Post, and Mrs. Winslow. Miss Frances Keith Wallace. In addition to the play, Miss Bethel Tull will sing a solo, there will be two orchestra selections, and Miss Lois Nelson will give a talk on "The Origin and Purpose of the Queen Esther Society." All adult members of the church and congregation are urged to attend this service. A cordial invitation is extended to the public.

Guild Will Give Vesper Service At Five O'clock

"Light Of The World," a Missionary Pageant, to Be Presented in First Baptist Church.

At a five o'clock vesper service tomorrow afternoon at the First Baptist church, the World Wide Guild will present a missionary pageant entitled "Light of the World." Guilds over all the world will hold similar services at the same hour.

About 20 girls of the local guild will take part in the pageant, in addition to a choir composed of members of the Baptist Young People's Union, which will be under the direction of Miss Boush Shanks. Miss Mildred Fox will represent the "Light of the World," and Miss Ida Frances French, Jennie Dolbow, Jennie Neilsen and Edith Happerst will be symbolic figures love, service, sympathy and hope.

Miss Marcel Rhine is director of the pageant and will sing a solo "The Light of the World is Jesus." Mildred Mulholland-Mohr will speak "Our Guild Prayer" and Mrs. M. V. Hymus will sing "Follow the Gleam."

The pageant will open with an introduction by the W. W. G. committee, Mrs. W. P. McAdory. While the choir sings the symbolic figures will appear and speak to the "Light of the World," followed by other members of the guild, representing the various nations. The Rev. J. E. Bortner will give the prayer and the covenant of the World Wide Guild will be given. The pageant will close with a vesper verse dismissal by the choir.
