which have been prepared for introduction.

The measures will come from both those who would modify the Volstead act and that out of the sentiment of the country on the eighteenth amendment and those who would tighten up the dry enforcement measure.

The drys will probably center their efforts on the administration bill which failed in the last session and which, among other things, would provide for local raids on distilleries used as commercial distilling places.

The wets will assail both the dry amendment and enabling act

from a number of directions.

William S. Vare, of Pennsylvania, and Frank L. Smith, of Illinois, were denied, at least temporarily, the senate seats to which they aspire.

When they presented themselves to take the oath of office the two would be senators were stopped by a resolution presented by Senator Norris, of Nebraska, declaring them unfit to sit in the senate because of the scandal surrounding their primary campaigns. It was agreed to postpone further action until tomorrow.

Independents Deliberating

The senate also put off until later the election of its secretary and other officers, around which another storm is threatening. A western republican insurgent group of five, who want guarantees as to farm relief and other legislative subjects, still was deliberating this afternoon whether to bolt the republican slate of senate officers
