AT THE THEATERS

Critic Gives Praise To Picture

"The world's greatest character actor in the most painstakingly perfect characterization of his life."

The soft lights in the studio projection room flashed on like a mechanical "click" following the first fadeout on the screen; for a few poignant seconds there had been absolute silence.

Then the voice again in the half-light; a whisper like an echo: "A perfect performance."

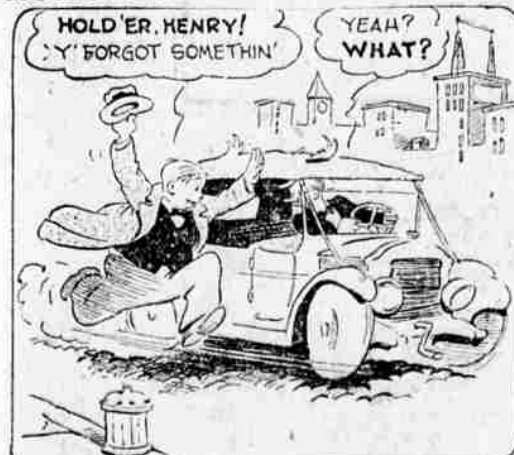
