Egg Prices Go Higher; Butter, Fruits Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 6 (AP)—Reflecting a substantial increase upward at the dairy exchange meeting yesterday afternoon. Extras climbed 2c to 4c, while firsts rose 1 1/2 to 3 1/2c. Prices on other grades are unchanged. The stiffening in egg prices is somewhat of an upset of market "dope," as prices have been on the decline for the last two weeks and production has been far in excess of consumption.

Butter prices are unchanged with a steady tone prevailing. In the vegetable and fruit division, market conditions are changed little from last week.

Annual Message Influences Wall Street Trading

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—The stock market turned reactionary again today after an early period of irregularity. The selling movement went into full swing soon after the publication of the president's message to congress, many commission houses suggesting profit-taking on the theory that "the good news was out."

Commission house comment was generally favorable to the recommendations in the president's address, special attention being paid to the railroad consolidation feature.

Montgomery Ward jumped five points from its early low to a new peak price above 116. American Republics and Green Cananea Copper ran up 5 to 6 points.

Total sales approximated 2,500,000 shares.

Wheat Slightly Higher At Close

CHICAGO, Dec. 6 (AP)—Starting at 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c decline, corn rose to well above yesterday's finish. Wheat opened unchanged to 1/2c off and later scored gains. Oats developed strength. Provisions were easy.

Corn closed firm, 3/4 to 3/8c net higher; wheat 3/4 to 5/8c up; oats at 3/4 to 1c advance and provisions varying from 3c decline to a rise of 7c.

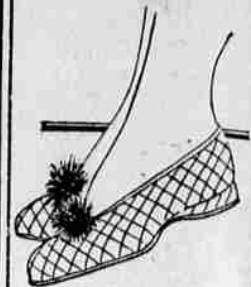

Maintenance Of High Wages Urge of Labor Leader

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (AP)—In prosperity and happiness the American people no stand as to be the subject of admiration and study the "world over," Secretary Davis declared here in the annual report of the labor department. He called for maintenance of high wages and welfare, for control of immigration, and for modification of tariff laws to allow the maintenance of the standard of living.

While we take into account the splendid life of plenty and peace

we enjoy," the labor secretary said, "we must not suppose that all is perfect with us. The distribution of our national wealth is good, but it is not perfect."

"No matter on what plea or excuse, reduction of wages is bad business and worse economics. The time has passed when any industry or employer who seeks to break down wage scales will be looked upon by the community as shrewd or clever industry. It is the mutual willingness of the worker to produce and the employer to pay for production that accounts in large measure for our present prosperity."
