MENUS

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit, cereal, cream scrambled eggs with bacon, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Escalloped rice and mushrooms, hearts of lettuce with French dressing, graham bread, baked apples with date and nut meringue, milk, tea.

DINNER—Roast pork, apple cream sauce, twice baked sweet potatoes, creamed cauliflower, stuffed celery salad, jellied prune pudding, milk, coffee.

The apple cream sauce served with roast pork will be found especially good with roast goose, domestic duck or smoked ham.

Apple Cream Sauce

Four to six tart apples, 1/2 to 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon white pepper, 1/2 cup grated horseradish, 1 cup heavy cream, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Wash, quarter and core apples, cook in as little water as possible until soft. Rub through a colander and add pepper, sugar and horseradish. Let cool. When ready to serve whip cream until firm, seasoning with salt. Beat in prepared apple mixture and serve at once.

BRIDGE POINTERS

The following hand was given yesterday. It being the second of a series in which the question is which fitness declarer should try when he has the opportunity of finessing in two or three suits.

Hand No. 2

WEST LEADS: ♠ 6-3, ♥ A-Q-J-6, ♦ 10-9-4, ♣ 7-5

NORTH: ♠ 10-9-4, ♥ 7-5, ♦ A-5-2, ♣ 10-9-8-6

SOUTH: ♠ A-4, ♥ A-2, ♦ A-Q-J-8-6, ♣ A-4

How should Declarer plan to play the above hand at No Trump?

THE ANSWER

In this case Declarer should win the first Club trick, East and West have nine Clubs and, as West's

fourth-best lead of the Treys shows that he held either four or five, the adverse division must be five in one hand and four in the other. There can be no advantage to be gained in ducking the first trick as neither adversary can be exhausted of Clubs; and losing a Diamond will lose the game because in addition to winning with the King that won when the fitness was lost, the adversary would make four Club tricks. As both adversaries are left with Clubs, it does not matter in which way Declarer finesses. Declarer can count two Spade tricks, one Club trick and the Ace of Hearts and Diamonds—a total of five tricks, to make game he must not lose more. He can do this if his Diamond finessing work successfully, but if he try his Heart finessing trick he will lose the game and would have risked the Diamond finessing afterwards. In order to avoid the double duck, Declarer should lead a Spade to trick 2, winning in Dummy; and should then lead the Ten of Diamonds and, if East do not cover, duck the finesse. If it win, he should not immediately risk his Heart finessing unless he has time to many Clubs have been discarded, and that he can afford to do so, knowing that even if it lose, the adversary could not save the game.

NORTH: ♠ 10-9-4, ♥ 7-5, ♦ A-5-2, ♣ 10-9-8-6

SOUTH: ♠ A-4, ♥ A-2, ♦ A-Q-J-8-6, ♣ A-4
