GRANTS PASS, Dec. 7 (AP)—The Kogue valley abivered (last night) in the coldest weather of the year when the mercury dropped to 26 degrees. This was a drop of six degrees from the night before. The only damage was to automobile radiators left unprotected.

PENDELTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The mercury dropped a notch lower last night, touching 17 degrees above to 18 the night before. No snow fell last night.

COLD FATAL TO FIVE LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Dec. 7 (AP)—The death toll from Monday's blizzard was placed at five today when John Huculak, Coalhurst school, was given up as lost by searching parties which hunted since Monday noon. Severe cold continued to grip the prairie provinces as a cold wave from the north plied the mercury down. Edmonton reported 35 below, the lowest in this province while Lethbridge had 27 below and Alberta 24 below. The source of the wintry wave still had the coldest weather with Fort Yukon, Y. T., reporting 46 below. The thermometer reached 22 below at Winnipeg.
