clear taking four spades, three hearts and the two minor Aces. Declarer should not risk the Diamond finesse (although, if it wins, Declarer would make five-odd without the Heart finesse) because, if it lost and let in West's Club, game might go with it.

Neither should Declarer win the first trick hoping to make a Grand Slam (as he could if both the Heart and Diamond finesses succeeded) because doing so would risk game; and game—more important than slam—should not be jeopardized for the chance of the big score.
