Slattery and Loughran to Meet for Light Heavy-weight-Belt Monday

NEW LONDON, Conn., Dec. 7 (AP)—A probable solution to the dual boxing championship system was forecast today by Thomas E. Donahue, of New London, president of the National Boxing association.

The winner of the Slattery-Loughran match is scheduled to meet Leo Lomax, of Aberdeen, Wash., whom both the N. B. A. and New York authorities recognize as the logical light heavy-weight contender.

Milking Time Varies With Cattle Breeds

NEWPORT, Eng. (AP)—While prominent dairymen throughout the British Isles hold conflicting views on the number of times a cow should be milked daily to insure maximum production, tests at the Newport Royal Dairy Show indicate milking frequency depends primarily on the breed involved.

In closely studied trials, Lincoln Red shorthorns, Friesians and Guernseys gave a greater yield when milked three times a day. Jersey Shorthorns, Red Polls and Jerseys gave a higher total production when milked but twice.

Farm Pointers

Potatoes in Oregon stored under cool dark conditions and at temperatures above the freezing point are found to come through the winter in good shape.

Heat is successfully used to destroy insects in small amounts of grain or similar products by the Oregon experiment station.

Spinach, cabbage, various root crops, curly kale, celery, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts and lettuce are the vegetables that have been in Oregon gardens this fall.

Parasitoid pests that chew their food and devour foliage, stomach poison must be used to get control, says the experiment station.

I. C. C. ASKS FOR GREATER POWER

Commission Would Control Railroad Consolidation More Completely

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—More power to control and direct railroad consolidation policies was sought from congress today by the interstate commerce commission.

In its annual report, the commission formally recommended a whole series of changes and additions to present laws governing railroad consolidation, nearly all of which would tend to give the federal government a firmer and more complete grip upon carrier organization.

The commission asked that congress make unlawful "any consolidation or acquisition of the control of one carrier by another in any manner whatsoever, except with our specific approval and authorization."

This proposal was designed to prevent railroad mergers being effected by round-about methods, in which the commission has been unable to intervene. It also asked congress to give it "broad powers to approve or disapprove such consolidations, acquisitions of control, mergers or unifications in any appropriate manner."

Asks Large Powers Finally, the commission suggested that it be allowed to disapprove consolidation projects when these did not provide for the inclusion of all the railroads which it considered should be included in a particular grouping.
