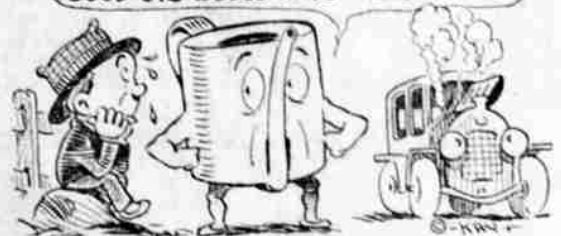

MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST—Baked pears, cereal, cream, baked hash, tomato sauce, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable pie, lettuce and hard cooked egg sandwiches, molasses pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Mutton chops, lyonnaise potatoes, creamed kohlrabi, jelly tomato salad, raised doughnuts with sweet cider, milk, coffee.

Perhaps you serve your coffee with the dinner or after-dinner coffee in the living room. In either of these cases the doughnuts and cider are served together as dessert. But if you like to serve coffee the last thing with dessert the cider might be served with the dinner and doughnuts and coffee form the dessert.

Vegetable Pie
One cup boiled rice, 1½ cups sliced tomatoes, 1 onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 can pears, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 1 cup mashed potatoes, 2 tablespoons grated cheese.

Peel and mince onion. Cook in melted butter until a bright straw color. Add tomato puree, rice, pears and parsley. Season with salt and pepper and turn into a buttered baking dish. The mashed potatoes should be well seasoned. Pour through a ricer making an even layer over top of rice mixture. Bake in a moderately hot oven until potatoes begin to brown on top. Sprinkle with grated cheese and return to oven long enough to melt cheese. Serve from baking dish.

This is a good way to use leftover mashed potatoes.

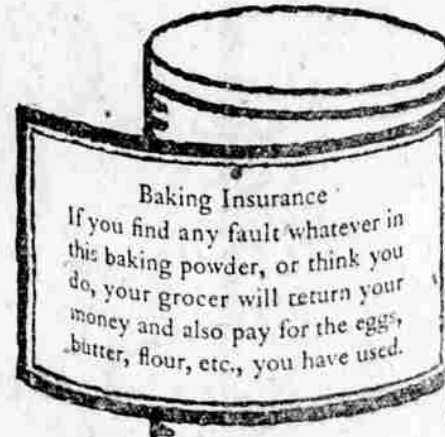
