

A. A. A. CAMPAIGN NOW UNDER WAY

Two Hundred Members
Needed to Insure La
Grande a Local Office

The Oregon State Motor association's membership drive in La Grande was officially started this morning, with W. C. Perkins as captain of the drive. Thirty-one members were enrolled for membership before the opening of the drive, and workers expect to have about 100 members by Saturday night.

It is necessary that the association have 200 La Grande members before the A. A. A. office be located here. However, with the cooperation and report received so far, indications are that the membership roll will reach about 200, Charles E. Gunther, advertising manager, said this morning.

A meeting of those working in the drive was held last night at the La Grande hotel, when Mr. Gunther gave a sales talk, telling of the benefits derived by the members of the A. A. A. and the value of the association office to a town or community. The best office in Oregon, outside of Portland, will be located here, Mr. Gunther said this morning.

Five Deaths Due To Snow Storms In Northwest

SEATTLE, Dec. 9. (AP)—Five deaths were reported from the severe storm which struck the Pacific Northwest and Western Canada last night and today, blanketing the region with a foot of snow. Even colder weather was predicted for tonight and tomorrow.

Five lives lost when their skiffs, in which they carried 1500 pounds of cargo, were wrecked in the San Juan Islands by the storm. A fifth man escaped when he refused to board the craft. They were taking the skiffs from shore to their boat when the skiff foundered. Parts of the boat were found along the beach this morning and a search was being made for their bodies.

Mrs. A. Thurnau, 59, was found lying in the snow badly frozen and paralyzed outside her home in Nelson, B. C., yesterday. She made a slight fight for life but died early today.

The white substance generally covered Washington except for a narrow strip on its coast line, and in the extreme southwest portion of the state. Temperatures today included Seattle 29, Spokane 22, and Bellingham 19. Several miles in Bellingham were forced to close down.

Smith Refuses To Grant Woman's Plea

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 9. (AP)—Standing clear of the ponderous legal machinery lawyers have set in motion to save Ruth Snyder from the electric chair, her mother has made direct and dramatic appeal to Governor Smith for executive clemency. The appeal of the almost hysterical woman, Mrs. Johnnie Brown, was denied.

In hearing lasting but a few minutes, held in the executive chamber at the capital yesterday, the governor gently but firmly denied the plea to save Mrs. Snyder from execution for the murder of her husband. He held forth one hope, however, that of presenting the plea at the expiration of the hearing of Mrs. Snyder and Henry Judd, Jr., who also was convicted of killing the art editor.

Lindbergh To Fly To Mexican Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. (AP)—America's aerial ambassador of good will, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, is to undertake another spectacular mission—this time a flight from Washington to Mexico City.

Accepting a telegraphic invitation from President Calles of Mexico, which reached him here yesterday, Lindbergh will add 2000 more miles to the log of his "Spirit of St. Louis," which already includes a New York-to-Paris hop and a long jaunt around the United States.

SENTENCED TO JAIL

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 9. (AP)—E. McLean and John Kallas of Weed, Cal., were each sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, in addition to heavy fines, on their pleas of guilty to the Medford justice court today on charges of transportation and possession of moonshine whiskey, following their arrest on the coast street at Weed this morning by Federal officer Terry Talbot. The case, a large machine will be confiscated by the government, Talbot declared, adding the pair were believed bound for Klamath Falls with their cargo of fifty gallons.

STILL SEEKING SAVAN

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 9. (AP)—Effort to clear up the mystery of the disappearance of Jordan Savan, who vanished in the wooded region near Mount Angel, Ore., is to be continued by Sheriff E. T. Jones of Clackamas county, he indicated today at Oregon City after returning from Mount Angel. Jones and Sheriff G. D. Rogers of Marion county renewed the investigation after the finding of the body of a dog believed to have been Savan's.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 9. (AP)—Factions in the First Baptist church here, developed over the employment of a pastor, agreed to a truce last night with a decision to employ the Rev. Robert L. PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 9. (AP)—Illness, caused originally by being gassed in the war, was given as the cause by Fred W. Angell, clerk of the Multnomah county court, for shortages to his account. This was stated by Angell in admissions to Prosecuting Attorney Stanley Meyers and other county officials who investigated his office after certified accountants had found shortages reported to total about \$1000. No charges had been filed today against Angell. He has resigned his office.
