"Yankee Clipper" Called An Epochal Picture

Once in an age there comes to the screen a picture that can be truly called an epochal. Such a production is "The Yankee Clipper," which shows for the last time today at the Colonial theater.

"The Yankee Clipper" is epochal in that it brings to the motion picture public something new, refreshing and exhilarating in the way of entertainment. For which this reviewer is duly grateful.

The something new offered by "The Yankee Clipper" is the revelation of a chapter in American history hitherto untouched by writers for and producers of the silent drama. It is that period of a quarter of a century just prior to and during the Civil War, the era of the famous clipper ship which brought glory to the American shipbuilding industry and won for this country the commercial supremacy of the sea.

The refreshing element in this fine picture is the unacknowledged plot of a drama that grips your attention in the first reel and holds it through a well-developed continuity to the final smashing climax. The exhilaration is supplied by the genuinely thrilling realism of a storm at sea, with the "Clipper" battling her way through a terrific typhoon around Cape Horn, and the lusty, red-blooded battle in which, handsome and rugged Bill Boyd quells a gang of villainous mutineers after a great fist fight in which no holds are barred.

Boyd is one of our favorite screen heroes. His work as the captain of the "Clipper" is probably the best he has done in his motion picture career. He has that rare combination of good looks and manliness that makes him a prime favorite with every devotee of the screen.

The lovely Elinor Fair is delightful as the heroine, and accentuates the fine impression she created in the De Mille masterpiece, "The Yellow Wallpaper." Walter Long does his "dirty" work in his most villainous manner, while Junior Coghlan, one of De Mille's latest prodigies, steals several scenes in a sympathetic role.

One of the most thrilling love stories that ever became a best seller has been made into a vivid melodramatic picture by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer under the title of "Body and Soul," and will be shown at the Star theater Sunday and Monday.

"Natural Drama" Is Found in Jungle Melodrama

"Natural drama" will be introduced to La Grande in an advanced state starting Monday when "Chang" the Siamese jungle picture produced by Ernest B. Schoedsack and Merian C. Cooper is released locally by Paramount.

The chief fear of these men is that before release many will look upon their production as a travel picture. They insist that it is straight drama, with suspense, comedy, continuity and tempo. It has a story, too.

"Natural drama," Mr. Cooper explains "is drama produced with natural actors in their own environment, living the story of their lives and their struggle for existence. This new jungle picture is the story of a people surrounded by an abundance of food. There is so much food that a superabundance of creatures live on it and on each other. There is the constant menace that this teeming vegetable and animal life will overwhelm the humans struggling against it. On this we built our story.

"We chose an attractive family living in the edge of the jungle for our central characters. Their staple food is rice, they build their bamboo houses on poles to protect themselves from jungle animals, they keep domestic animals and chickens. They are constantly faced with the problem of protecting themselves against the depredations of beasts—tigers, leopards, bears, snakes, elephants. The elephants become their best friends and sources of wealth when trained, but in wild herds they are to be feared.

"In photographing the lives of these people we always kept the dramatic values in mind. The story develops, shows the wavering between hope and fear and the final triumph over a herd of more than four hundred wild elephants.

"We wanted it to stand by itself as a piece of dramatic entertainment. The fact that, in addition to this, it has scenes of great scenic beauty, shows the people untroubled by civilization and that there are thrills and laughs in it, leads me to hope that we have accomplished something new in the field of picture production."
