PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10 (AP)—The final day of the sessions of the Pacific coast intercollegiate athletic conference dawned on a wry group of faculty representatives and graduate managers of the ten member institutions—a committee that had labored into the night in an attempt to reach an agreement on voting matters arising from the football schedule for 1928.

The schedule, announced Thursday night by coaches and graduate managers, resulted immediately in a furor.

Behind locked doors, in a star chamber session, faculty representatives of the conference not only did NOT approve the schedule but labored long into the night on plans said to hinge about the "round table" or revolving schedule plan whereby each member of the conference would meet each other conference football team at least twice in the next four-year period.

BUCKS, BULLDOGS SCHEDULE GAMES

Baker and Pendleton Basketball Contests Are Arranged for Season

Two of the larger schools in Eastern Oregon have already announced their schedules, and La Grande high is expected to have them ready to publish in the near future.

Four La Grande games are included in Baker's and Pendleton's schedule as follows:

Pendleton at La Grande, Jan. 27; La Grande at Baker, Feb. 11; La Grande at Pendleton, Feb. 17.

The Baker schedule includes games with the three other large high schools of Eastern Oregon, Pendleton, La Grande and Milton-Freewater, as well as Union and Haines. A pre-season game with some Idaho school will be arranged for Jan. 6 or 7 if possible, it was indicated.

"The schedule is not just as we would have wished," Principal Page said. "We have Milton-Freewater and La Grande on consecutive nights and we have Haines and Pendleton on consecutive nights. It was necessary however to take dates which were open and which would accommodate needs of the other schools."

If the tournament is played a week later than is expected another game can be scheduled the weekend of February 24-25.

The schedule follows:

Jan. 17—Union there; Jan. 20—Haines there; Jan. 27—Haines here; Jan. 28—Pendleton here; Feb. 3—La Grande here; Feb. 4—Milton-Freewater here; Feb. 10—Pendleton there; Feb. 11—La Grande there; Feb. 17-18—County tournament here; Feb. 22-25 (probably) tournament.

The Pendleton high hoop squad has 14 games on the 1927-28 schedule with a few more likely to be sandwiched in before the actual playing season starts.

Coach Quinn has between 40 and 45 candidates out for the varsity five, but will whittle this number down to workable size before next week.

Garden, Cronin and Fisk are veterans of last year's arrangement, bidding for places this season. Football men out are Erwin, Halverson, Moyer, Schanpen and King. There is other light but promising material out for the first five.

La Grande, Baker, Union, Mac-HI, Athena, Adams Hells are on the Buckaroo schedule this year.
