News of the Churches

Christmas Plans Now Under Way Local Churches

**Special Services Are Being
Arranged for Yuletide;
Sunday's Programs Sug-
gest Season.**

The spirit of the Christmas season is already manifest in the churches of the city, and services are offering exceptional opportunities for the development, cultivation and expression of this spirit—the spirit of the great Christian festival.

Churches are already making plans for special Christmas programs, a few of which have already been announced, and here and there a suggestion of the Christmas season will be found in the church programs for this Sunday.

A group of 40 children of the Junior Christian Endeavor society of the First Presbyterian church will present a Christmas program at that church next Sunday evening, Dec. 18, beginning at 7:30 o'clock.

Preparations for the program are now under way by Mrs. Gustav Wiesler, superintendent of the Junior C. E., and her assistant, Miss Grace Gebel, who will be assisted by Mrs. E. P. Mossman. The nature of the program has not yet been announced.

St. Peter's Episcopal Church. Christmas will also be suggested in the musical program at St. Peter's Episcopal church Sunday evening, when the choir will sing the anthem "Holy Night" by Hawley.

Sunday's services at the Episcopal church will be of special interest to music lovers of the city. Ray Williams will sing "Father in Thy Mysterious Presence," by Johnson, during the morning hour of worship and in the evening the fourth of a series of pipe organ recitals will be given with the Rev. Oliver Riley at the console, assisted by Miss Phyllis Barnes, one of his pupils, and with Mrs. Paul Pollman, of Baker, as soloist.

The day's worship at this church will begin with holy eucharist at 8 o'clock in the morning, followed by church school at 9:45 and the morning prayer and sermon at 11. The subject of the sermon, which will be given by the Rev. Mr. Riley, will be "How To Study the Bible Intelligently."

At 6 o'clock in the evening the Wayfarers' guild will meet.

First Presbyterian Church. Sunday morning during the 11 o'clock worship hour at the First Presbyterian church the choir will sing "I Come to Thee," by Clara Krom and Mrs. Ray Pollman, soprano, will sing "God's Promise" by Metcalfe. Mrs. Hawley Richardson will direct the choir. The pastor will bring a message on the subject announced several weeks ago but postponed, "Have You Remembered the Sift."

In the evening at 7:30 o'clock the choir will sing two numbers to be selected, and Miss Edna Macgregor will be at the organ. The pastor will give a pre-Christmas sermon, "To Fall of One's Self."

Sunday school precedes the morning church services at 9:45 o'clock. The Junior Christian Endeavor meets at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and the Intermediate, Senior and young people's C. E. meets at 6:30 o'clock.

First M. E. Church. Paul Knauts will sing a solo at the 11 o'clock hour tomorrow morning at the First Methodist Episcopal church and the pastor's theme will be "The New Emphases."

Church of God.

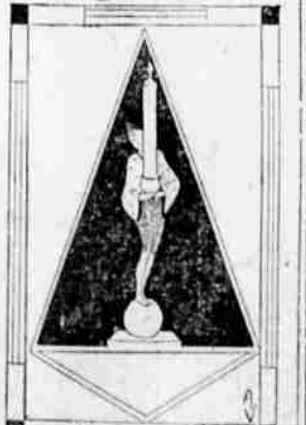

"I'm having a nervous breakdown," the note said, "Have had it for months, may the world forgive me. I can't help it. I can't go on. My health is gone."

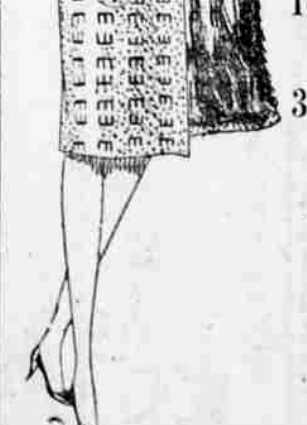

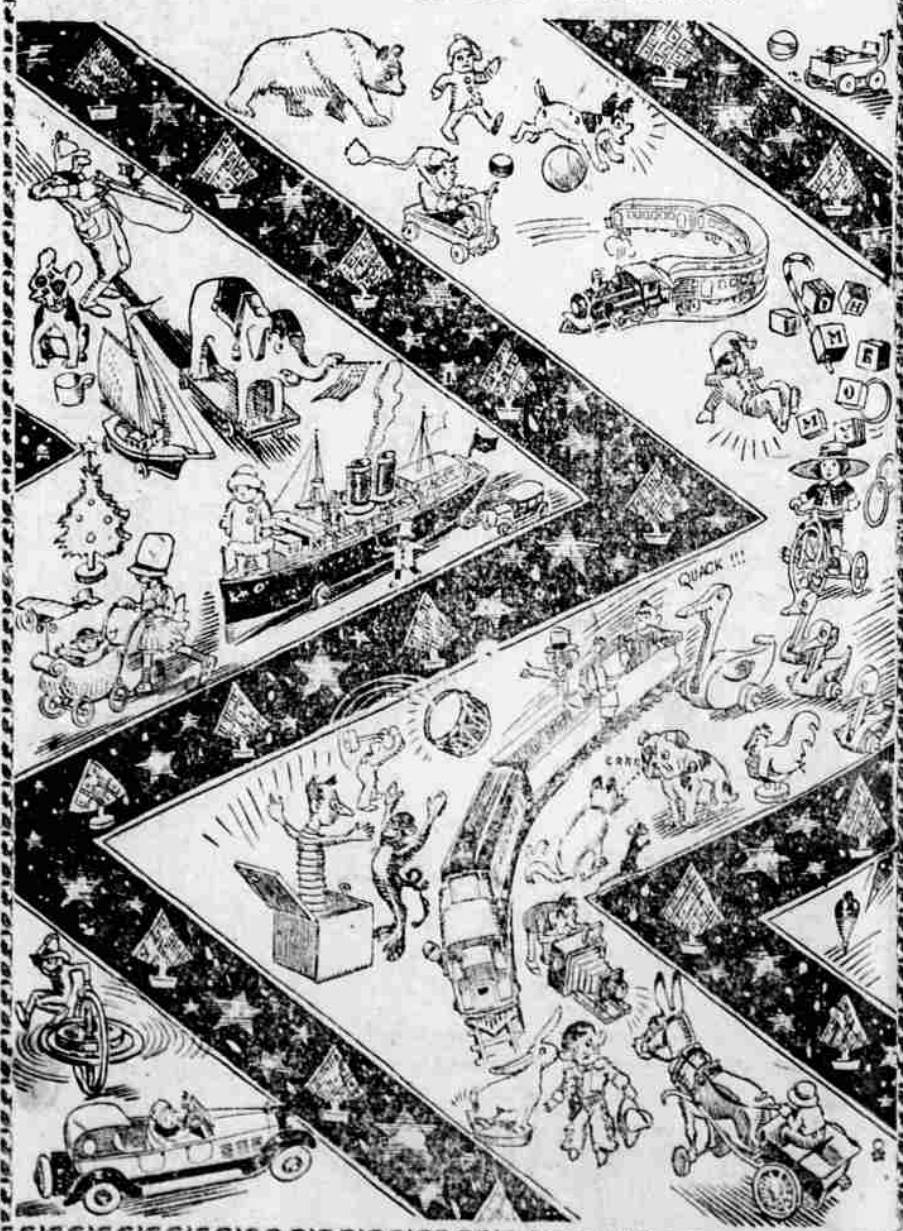
