### McFadden Bank Law Justified, McIntosh Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Broader power given national banks, chiefly by the McFadden banking law were credited Sunday by J. W. McIntosh, controller of the currency, with having checked the expansion of state banking institutions in the field they formerly occupied.

It was freely predicted by supporters of the so-called McFadden bill that its enactment would bring new life to the system of national banks. The controller said, "Although it is too early to judge its full effect, it has fully justified itself, as additional to the resources of the national banking system have more than offset the losses during the three-year period prior to the enactment of the act. Too short a time has elapsed to allow banking to fully adjust itself. I feel, therefore, that no additional banking legislation is necessary at this time."

The McFadden bill allowed some increase in the number of branch banks, the controller said. He said 127 had so far been established. Notwithstanding this the total of national banks in existence on October 31 was placed at 7,832, or 176 less than the total a year before. There were 135 national bank failures during the year ending October 31, involving an aggregate capital of \$3,257,000. On the latest date for which conditions were reported, Oct. 10, 1927, national banks had total resources of \$47,213,824,000, the largest amount ever reported. This exceeded by more than \$1,500,000,000 the banking resources indicated one year before.

A part of the growth was in savings accounts, the report indicated, since the total of national bank savings accounts on June 30, 1927, was \$5,875,679,000, an increase of \$312,000,000 over the savings reported one year previously.

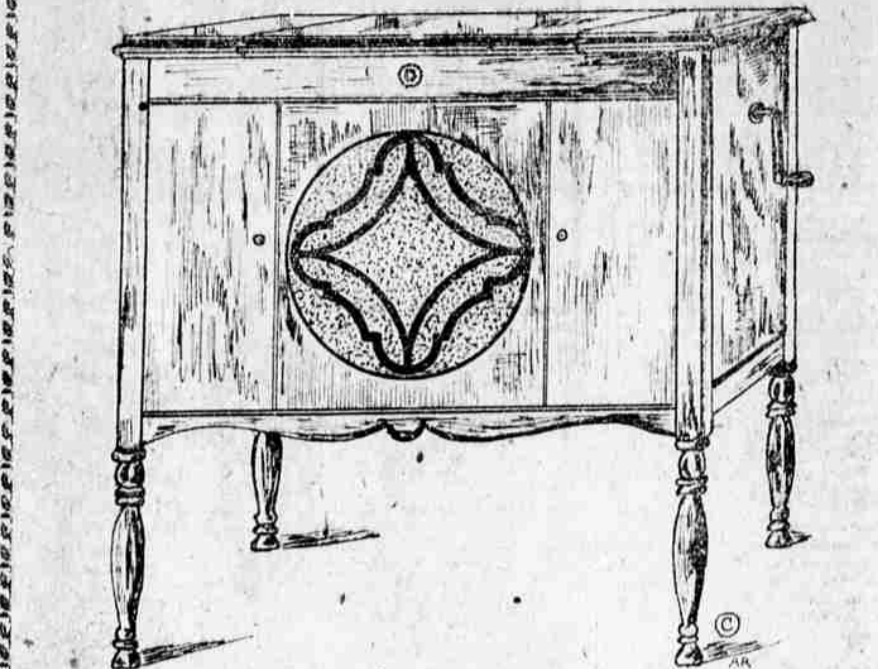
### Describes Uses Of the Navy in Times of Peace

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The wide field of peace time activities open to a modern day navy was graphically described here in the annual report of Secretary Wilbur, who told of ocean searches for lost aviators, the navy's part in Mississippi flood rescue work, the operations of American ships in Chinese and Nicaraguan waters and of the work of Marines and Bluejackets ashore on foreign soil. With all of these duties to be performed, Mr. Wilbur said the navy had carried on with the personnel so reduced that one ship could not be placed in active service until another was put into drydock. This process had gone on until it was seriously affecting the efficiency of the operations of the fleet. The operating plan of reorganizing forces in 1927 was based on an enlisted strength of 85,000 men but only 82,932 men were available because of the limitation fixed by congressional appropriation.

Legislation proposing an increased attendance at the Naval Academy and higher appropriations for the enlisted personnel was recommended to relieve the shortage of officers and men now keenly felt throughout the service.

The failure of the Geneva conference, the controller said, "requires a building program to meet our legitimate requirements for national defense and to maintain the 2-3 ratio in cruisers and aircraft carrier. Replacement tonnage in destroyers will soon be needed."

### Loughran 2-to-1 Favorite Over Jimmy Slattery

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—Two world champions in the light heavyweight division, Tommy Loughran, at Philadelphia, and Jimmy Slattery, of Buffalo, will struggle against each other in a 15-round title bout at Madison Square Garden tonight.

This condition is the result of rival boxing authorities. Loughran was recognized by the New York State Athletic commission as champion when he whipped Mike McGuire. The National Boxing association with a membership in 24 states, acknowledges Slattery as the title holder.

Loughran's followers have made him a 2 to 1 favorite.

Fight fans will be given a bargain attraction at the garden on Friday evening with two championship bouts over the 15-round distance in one ticket. Ted Morgan, of Seattle, will guard his crown against Joe Glick, challenger for Junior lightweight honors.

While there has been no possibility of the flyweight championship made vacant when Fidel La Barba quit the ring to enter college, the New York authorities have assigned Izzy Schwartz, of this city, to box Newby Brown, of Iowa, for the title.
