TAX PROBLEMS DISCUSSED IN PORTLAND MEET

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—Starting a study of state tax problems here today the sub-committee on equalization re-distribution and indirect taxes adopted a resolution offered by John Carlin, of Medford. It declared:

"It is the sense of this commission that revenue from any new source of taxation, that may be adopted shall be applied for the purpose of the reduction and equalization of taxes on general property."

The resolution was proposed in order to define the work of the committee and was proposed after a general discussion of two hours among the committee members.

A. A. Smith, of Baker, chairman of the sub-committee said that in his opinion the people of Oregon would not pass any kind of an income tax. "You cannot put up an income tax to the people of this state on the basis of equalization and redistribution that they will accept," he said.

This statement was challenged by A. R. Shumway of Milton. He thought a right kind of income tax would pass.

His son, W. L. Davis, is the new proprietor of the Oregon Trail tourist camp here.

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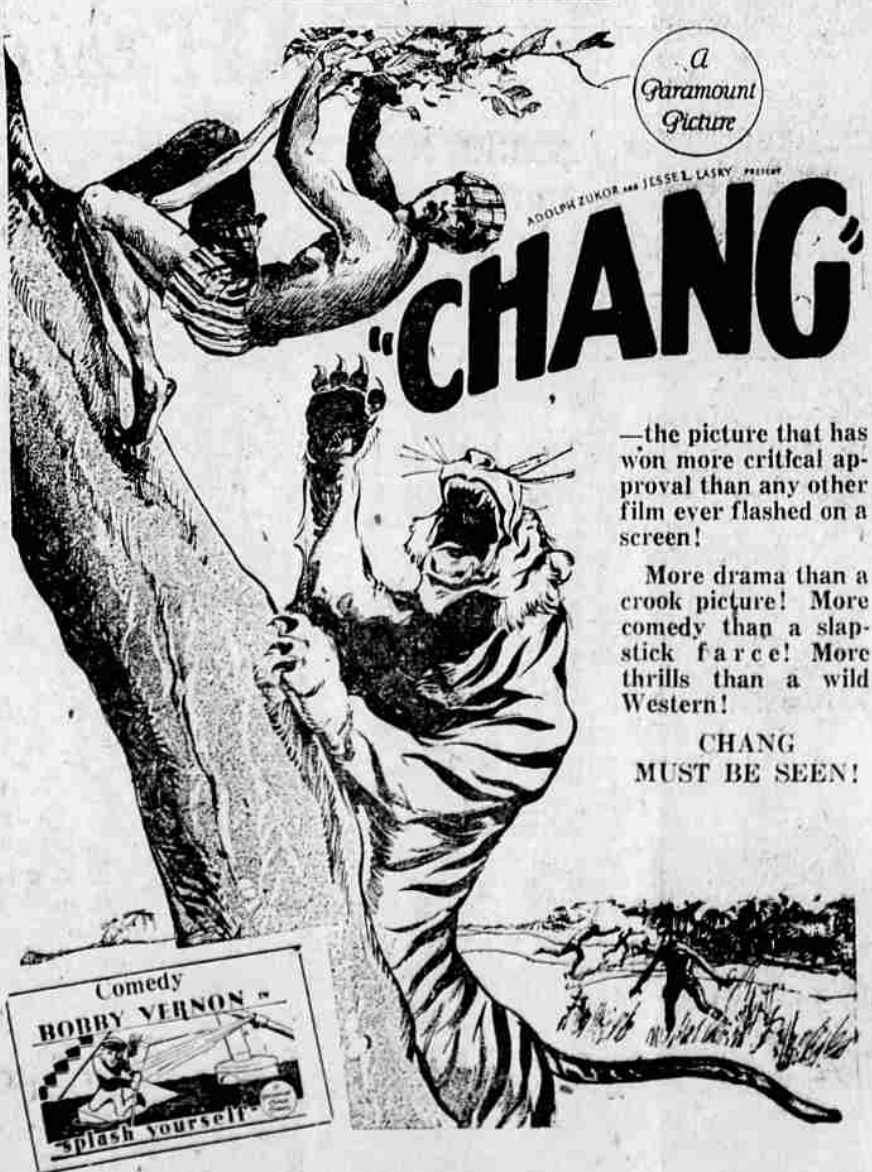
