

LESS VEGETABLES ON THE MARKET

Freezing Temperatures
Reduce Supply—Spud
Trade Is Active

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12 (AP)—Freezing temperatures which have been experienced during the last few days have considerably reduced the supply of bunched vegetables and cabbage on the local produce markets and prices are somewhat higher today as a result. Bunched vegetables are scarce and what are to be had are quoted as much as the above last week's figures. Cabbage has advanced as high as 1.25 a pound and if the cold spell holds much longer it is thought likely that the price will go higher. Growers are holding for 1 1/2 to 2 a pound for their product at shipping points.

The onion market is firm. Oregon yellow Danvers being in demand at from \$1.25 to \$2 per cwt., according to grade. Growers are inclined to hold their onions for higher prices and increased demand is expected in the market.

The potato market is fairly active although most of the demand appears to be for the commercial grades. They are moving in fair volume around 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 per pound.

Except for slightly increased demand in the turkey division, the poultry market is holding steady and firm. Choice turkeys are moving in good volume at 42c top. Receipts are somewhat heavier than last week but it is not probable that the market will be oversupplied as heavily as at Thanksgiving time.

Butter and egg prices and quotations on country dressed meats are unchanged from last week.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Opening at 1/2 to 3/4 decline, Chicago wheat soon showed a slight further rise. Corn displayed power to rally, starting 1/4 to 1/2 down and recovering a little more but then receding. Provisions tended to decline.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 3/4 net lower; corn 1/2 to 3/4 down; oats a shade to 1/2 up and provisions unchanged to 1/2 decline.

Trading Bullish In Stock Market On Street Today

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—Speculative sentiment was distinctly bullish in today's stock market. Revival of excited speculation in the airplane shares was based on the interest shown in the proposed Lindbergh flight to Mexico City, and expectations of a substantial growth in commercial air route developments next year. Wright Aero-nautical, manufacturers of the famous "Whitwind motor," secured more than 10 points to a new high record at \$7, as against a low of 2 1/2 earlier this year.

U. S. Steel common was up 3 points to 14 1/2, after having sold at 13 1/2 last week. Abraham and Straus ran up more than 6 points, and a number of others, including Houston, Atlantic Refining, American Steel Foundries, International Telephone and Electric, Canadian Copper sold 3 to 5 points higher.

More than a score issues broke into new high ground, the list including Atchafalca preferred, Porto Rican Tobacco, A and B, Goodyear, and Manhattan Shirt, culminated more.

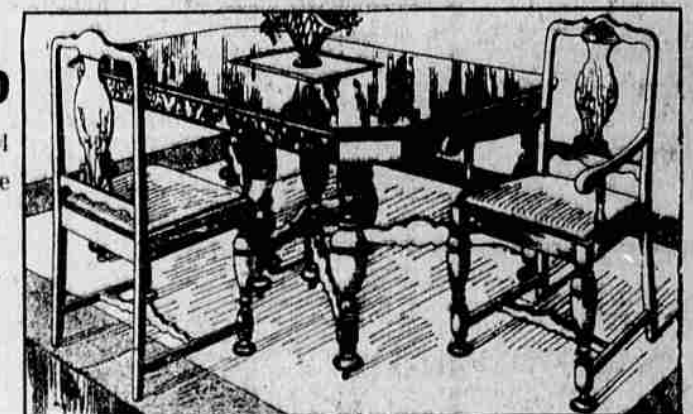

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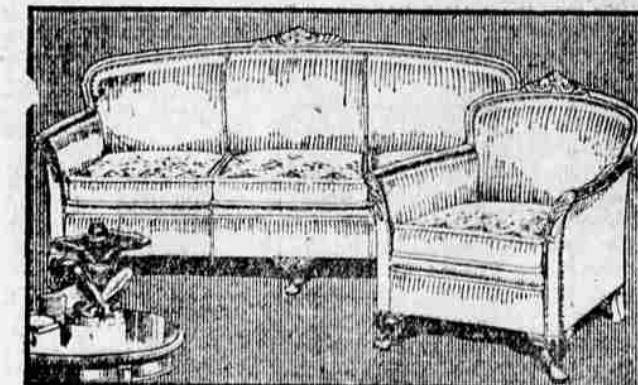

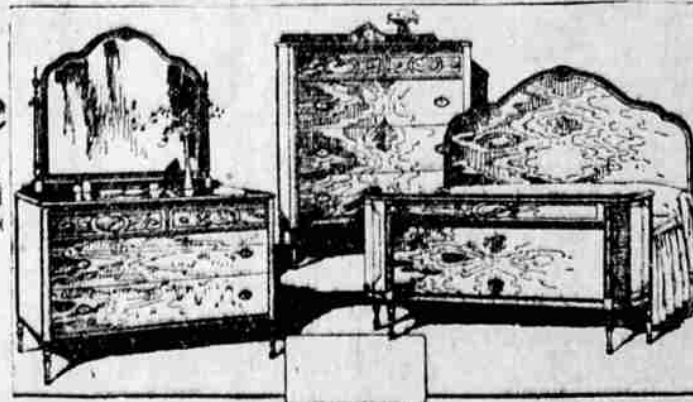
