Baptists Honor Miss Campbell at Supper at Church

Honoring Miss Louise Campbell, a returned missionary from China, who was in this city yesterday, a covered dish supper was held last evening at the First Baptist church, attended by members of the World Wide guild, the Woman's society and Young People's organization.

Four tables were arranged in the basement of the church, where dinner was served, and the blessing was given by four girls of the guild, Misses Ida Frances French, Edith Thappsett, Jennie Dolbow and Jennie Nelson, who were dressed as angels, representing the angels of love, sympathy, hope in the paganant recently given by the guild.

After dinner those attending went to the community room of the church, where they were joined by others, to hear Miss Campbell, who gave an interesting talk on conditions in China.

She told of the revolution in China and the suffering of the people, especially those who had become Christians, this resulting from the circulation of pamphlets, called "godless," which claimed the missionaries to be spies for their country and their followers unpatriotic. It is her opinion, however, that the revolution will result in much good for China, because it has opened the eyes of the people.

She related many interesting experiences in her work in a girls' school and among the women of China.

Following Miss Campbell's talk a part of the "Lighting the World" vesper service, presented by the World Wide guild recently, was repeated, which was a candle-lighting service in honor of Miss Campbell.

This evening the Campfire Guardians' association will meet in the Neighborhood club rooms.

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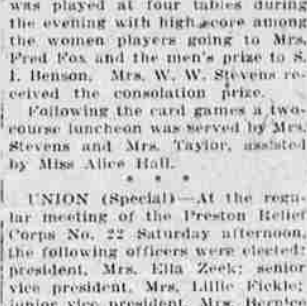
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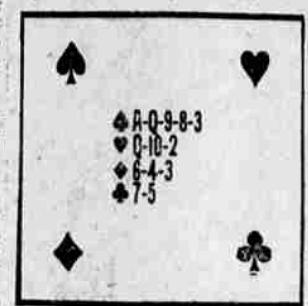
