"One entertainment feature, which we greatly enjoyed was provided at the Portland when a sextette made up of negro waiters entertained us," said Mr. Vaughn. Remus Held Guilty Of Court Contempt

CINCINNATI, Dec. 14 (AP)—George Remus, on trial for the slaying of his wife, was cited for contempt of court late today after he again had verbally attacked Prosecutor Charles F. Taft II and his assistants.

Judge Chester R. Shook announced that he found Remus guilty of contempt of court because of his unjustified attacks upon the prosecutor but would defer sentence until after conclusion of the murder trial. Remus called Taft and his associates "these noisy Jews."

Squatters Will Stay in Woods During Winter

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—E. H. Best and M. Roy Davis, squatters in the Fish Creek desert district of the Umpqua national forest, arrived in Roseburg today after spending 20 days in jail at Portland for contempt of court, after they had failed to abandon their claims within the time specified by the court. Carrying a letter from the district forester, C. M. Granger, giving them permission to remain on their claims until weather conditions will permit removal of the squatters or until the lands have been re-classified, if that is done, before the weather clears sufficiently to enable them to come out, the men are returning to their homes in the forest reserve without fear of further molestation, at least for several months.

During the winter, efforts will be made to have the lands upon which they are located re-classified, making them available for homestead, in which case the men may be able to claim title to the property for which they have put up such a determined fight against the forest agency, which had been striving to force their election as trespassers.

Best and Davis appeared this morning before County Judge Quinn, asking the county to assist Mrs. C. W. Nichols, whose husband is now in jail in Portland on a trespass charge. Mrs. Nichols, they claim, was left without sufficient provisions, food and protection and as she is holding a child in a tent she will require immediate help, the men said. Mr. Nichols, according to their statement, was arranging to come out for supplies when he was taken into custody, and Mrs. Nichols is now short of provisions, the court was told.

The permission given Best and Davis to remain upon their claims during the winter, prevents them from giving shelter to any persons other than members of their own families and so they cannot take Mrs. Nichols in, they say, and as they have only enough provisions for their own families during the winter they are unable to help the woman, so are asking the county to look out for her needs until her husband is allowed to return to his home.

AIR HERO IS GREETED BY GREAT CROWD

ably not even the greatest Mexican hero entering the capital has ever received such a welcome from the people as that prepared for Lindbergh.

The interest was evident from the moment President Calles received the news of Lindbergh's progress from the Associated Press. He expressed great satisfaction at the way his famous guest seemed to be covering the country. When Calles retired he left orders to be called early for Calles like everybody else is afraid that Lindbergh's coming may slip in ahead of schedule.

More American flags probably than were ever flown before in the capital of Mexico, fluttered in the streets. As soon as news of Lindbergh's coming spread, flags began to appear on the flagpoles and balconies and in show windows throughout the downtown district. Street vendors offered the emblems of both countries for sale, decorations under government orders festooned the principal avenues with red, white and blue bunting for the United States and with green, white and red bunting for Mexico.

Late in the night electric signs reading "Vic Lindbergh" blazed a greeting to the air hero. Col. Lindbergh was given a taste of the wild enthusiasm which his brilliant exploits have created in the hearts of Mexicans just as everywhere else. As soon as his plane had come to a stop the spectators surged around it and lifted him from the cockpit, placing him upon willing shoulders and carrying him in triumph to the auto sent by Ambassador Morrow out on the field.

K. C. Special Train Wrecked, One Dead

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 14 (AP)—The Kansas City Special, crack St. Louis and San Francisco railway train, collided head on with a freight train near Portia, Ark., early today, resulting in serious injury to Guy Nichols, mail clerk of Springfield, Mo., and the probable death of H. E. Thorne, Thayer, Mo., engineer of the special. His body had not been found several hours after the accident.

Reports to the road's offices here indicated that none of the passengers was hurt. It was stated that the passenger train, east bound from Kansas City to Jacksonville, Fla., was running about 15 minutes late and crashed into the freight in a dense fog.

Engines on both trains were turned over and two mail cars and a baggage car were derailed. Two cars of livestock also were overturned.

Teller's Conduct Is Investigated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Commissioner Teller of the shipping board said today that his conduct had been investigated by the department of justice in connection with a loan made to former Commissioner W. S. Hill by persons connected with the West Coast shipping interests.

The Commissioner, who is the Pacific coast representative on the board, said he had told the department that he knew nothing about the case until Mr. Hill, a South Dakotan, told the board about it.

"It was natural for the department of justice to question me regarding the matter," he said. "As I had been financially interested in Swaine and Hoyt (shipping company of San Francisco) before becoming a member of the board, I had all the interest I had in boats operated by that company. Lindbergh so faithfully on his epoch-making flight from New York to Paris and now had carried him more than 2800 miles from Washington to Mexico City made a beautiful landing in the middle of the field, kicking up great clouds of dust which for a few minutes obscured the American air hero and his plane from sight.

Meets Calles

The 3-motorcycle, policemen at length surrounded the plane and placed Col. Lindbergh in an automobile and escorted him to the presidential box, where President Calles and Dwight W. Morrow, American ambassador to Mexico had anxiously awaited his arrival.

At 2:50 p. m., the presidential band played the Star Spangled Banner as Col. Lindbergh entered the presidential stand and received greetings from President Calles and then from Ambassador Morrow.

As the American airman greeted Mexico's chief executive, a great roar of cheering rose among the thousands of spectators rejoicing.
