Novelties for This Year's Christmas Giving

To start with you must consider the recipient of the gift slightly—if she is ultra-modern, and most sophisticated you will have no trouble at all finding something to please her. But suppose she is really and truly mid-Victorian—well then you will have to select with greater care, his gift. Of course, he would never admit he was mid-Victorian—they never do! But if you keep in mind his being very conventional and matter-of-fact and conservative you will doubtless be able to select some little thing he will really like.

If your friend is collecting antiques, say some particular thing—like old clocks or old glass or second and third grade readers, Mr. Guffey's preferably—your task is somewhat simplified—and then again it isn't. Increase your search may lead you far afield—but it will be a fascinating search for all that.

For the Antiqueophile You may find the very thing you are looking for, in some tiny antique shop in another town, and at the same time a pair of those charmingly elegant ladies of fashion of the eighteenth-century that you have been wanting for ever so long. To one who enjoys it, there is nothing quite so delightful as to browse around in an antique shop.

For contrast, let us turn to our ultra-modern young person who feels, and quite sincerely too, that the lovely things that originated in the Paris exhibition of modern decorative arts are "perfectly darling." Is there something for her? Yes, indeed.

The Low Perspective To begin with in the modern art it seems to be largely a matter of perspective. That sounds like the wisest bromide—but it isn't. A low perspective especially characterizes the modern things. One is expected to sit on a cushion or low stool, or at the very highest on a bench lower than the average chair which is eighteen inches from the floor.

For this purpose there are lovely gay cushions to sit on—and a tray along side of an unusual shape, with a mirror top and feet, that bring it the least bit higher than the cushions.

A gift of a table to fit in with the low perspective might be much appreciated. There are several kinds. One was composed of three circular glass shelves graduated in size, the smallest at the top. These had a center rod surrounded by a cut crystal handle, and the base of this rod was a silver star. Another table was of a most amusingly odd shape, painted orange with queer little shelves and nooks below it.

Book-holds and Flower-holds If she has such a table you may want to give her something for it, and there are many new things from which to choose. There are delightfully weird grotesques from Austria. Some of these have no more serious purpose in this world than to be laughed at. Others are ash trays or incense burners. Chinese elephants with their fine service of modeling fit in beautifully with the modern art.

Flowers for flowers come in never ending varieties. This year few ones of odd shapes are especially designed to hold cactus plants. Surely one would not feel tempted to sit on one of these low tables if a warning in the way of many-spined cactus sat on top of it.

New Thing In Light If your friend likes flowers, she may enjoy a new 'sought from stand that holds three pots at different heights. The shape suggests a husky and vigorous sunflower, but is painted red and green.

Bottles filled with colored water are made into lamps and having bright colored shades fit in very well with the modern effect. A very new and lovely thing in the way of a light was held by a kneeling figure in pottery on an onyx base. The clouded glass she held upright reminded you of a calla lily. In its center was a flame-shaped white electric globe. The effect was at once dignified and most unusual.

Nice Things In Glass If you have friends who like glass, you will find some very excellent things awaiting your selection. For the hostess there is a punch bowl with glasses to match. The punch bowl is high and has a dome-shaped lid. At one side is a notch for the handle of the ladle to prevent. The bowl and glasses are painted with sprays of flowers. A handsome tray completes the set. For one who enjoys the sun room or porch there are several kinds of lounge seats. A basket tray holds the glasses with glasses set around it and has a high handle over all, so that it may be carried easily. These sets

come in different colors, rose, amber, green and so on. In the same part of the store, intricate arrangements of glass beads are made in the style—parrots and pheasants and birds—such odd birds that never were.

New and Old In Jewelry Speaking of beads, if one is able to give jewelry for one's gift, there are things that make one catch one's breath at some of the jewelry shops. Here again the ancient and modern are sharply contrasted.

If the one to whom you are giving favors for old things, you will find the jewelers have collected some of these for you. Little sets are available, for instance a necklace, a pair of earrings and a brooch. But match, and were made for the bottle of 1780. Some times a pair of bracelets are included.

The modern things have much charm and great beauty of workmanship and design. Some of them attain tiny diamonds in platinum. There are so many things from which to choose—rings, pins, hat ornaments, bracelets, watches, clocks, cigarette cases and so on.

"Just What I Wanted!" Jewelry for personal adornment has been influenced strongly by fashions in dress. Simple lines have called for greater variety in hat ornaments. Wide bracelets are worn. Pins are used for the shoulders or hip, where formerly bar pins were used for the open collar of shirtwaists. Pearls fit in with so many kinds of costumes that they have had great popularity.

Consider the one on whom you are about to inflict your gift. (Alas some gifts are an infliction, aren't they?) It makes one perfectly glib to have to say "Thank you" for them. To give that very thing is the most fun of all. May you succeed in pleasing each of your friends in our parting good wish for you!

Many Jews Quit Palestine; Style Obsolete, Claim

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Polish Jews who went to Palestine to live in the early days of the Zionist movement are returning to Poland by hundreds, declaring that they did not find happiness in their new home.

Among the women the complaint is heard frequently that Palestine was too far behind the times in styles.

Though Zionist sympathies are strong among the three million Jews in Poland, those who emigrated to Palestine say they found it impossible to settle under the new conditions. The number of emigrants to Palestine is decreasing in consequence.

According to statistics of the Polish emigration office, 12,894 persons emigrated to Palestine in 1925 and 248 returned. In 1926 the number of emigrants dropped to 6,840 while the number of returnees increased to 1,886. From available estimates for 1927 it is estimated that the number of returning emigrants will also be large.

The Zionists say the failure of the emigration of Polish Jews is caused by the fact that the wrong class of people had left Poland. Instead of laborers and capitalists, who are needed, the middle bourgeoisie class formed the bulk of the emigration.

Polish Jewesses, it appears, are now unhappy in Palestine. They have discouraged relatives and friends from emigrating and are using their influence to get their men to return to Poland.

A great number of Jewish men assert that their women are demoralized by the Vanity Fair quarter called "Nalecki," and that they feel unhappy in Palestine because the styles are far behind Paris and Warsaw.

Sugar Beet Yield In Buhl Gathered

BUEL, Ill. (Special)—The sugar beet harvest has closed in the Buhl country. One hundred and forty cars of beets were shipped out of Buhl and 240 out of Cedar. This marks a total of 380 cars or 19,000 tons. More than \$100,000 has been paid to Buhl growers.

The biggest tonnage produced by one farmer was grown by Adolph Maehackel. He had 66 1/2 acres which made a total of 1500 tons. The highest production average was made by E. T. Sandmeyer who had 2 1/2 acres which yielded 25

1000 per acre.

The acreage this year in the Buhl and Castleford country was about 1500 acres according to L. F. Wiseman, who has had charge of the beets in the west end. He says that the average next season probably will be doubled if the present indications are followed.

As a general rule the crop has been considered a profitable one by the growers this year. There have been a few yields in the Castleford country where they were raising beets for the first time that were not so successful, but most fields have made a good profit.
