THE KISS AND TUBERCULOSIS

Tuberculosis is an infectious disease caused by a germ known as the Tubercular Bacillus. It is not hereditary; however, it is infectious. If infections is meant that if the germ is transferred from an infected animal (usually from one human to another) the organism may find a place to lodge and grow in the well individual.

Since tuberculosis is transferred from one individual to another, it is plain to be seen that by proper precautions and protective measures this dreaded disease, which causes one-third of all deaths, can finally be removed.

You have seen a mother hold the baby to her lips and actually permit the helpless one to press its lips against hers for a lengthy period. You have seen the good neighbors file in one by one and plant a liberal kiss on the child's lips. The nurse maid comes in for her share of the responsibility by liberal offerings of kisses to the babe.

It has been shown by post-mortem examinations at one of the large institutions in America that one out of every seven such examinations show either healed or existing tubercular lesions of the lungs. With tuberculosis individuals so numerous and widely distributed, it is unreasonable to ask for less kissing and complete abstinence of kissing infants and growing children on the mouth? The awful toll each year from tuberculosis stands as a reminder of the importance of your cooperation in limiting this dreaded malady.
