STOLZ ARRIVES TO MEET ALLEN

Bend Scrapper to Tangle with La Grande Boy in Main Event Saturday

With all arrangements completed, with boxers arriving here and with ticket sales promising, local fans are expecting an interesting boxing card at Rex hall Saturday night, beginning at 8:45 o'clock.

Glenn Ford, 160, of La Grande, will meet Russell Anderson, 119, of La Grande, in the first four-round preliminary. Two other four-round battles are scheduled, between Red Nichols, 145, of Joseph and Thurston Lay, 145, of Enterprise, and between Kenneth Davis, 140, of La Grande, and

Sammy Watson, 110, of Spokane, Wash.

Joe Blackwell, 152 pounds, of Enterprise, will meet Tiger Robinson, of Cave, in the six-round semi-final and Johnny Allen, 140, of La Grande, will fight Earl Stolz, 145, of Bend, Ore. in the 10-round main event.

Stolz Arrives

Stolz arrived in La Grande today and is in excellent condition for the scrap. Stolz meeting Allen here about a year ago he has fought six times, winning four bouts by knockouts, winning a decision and fighting one draw. Allen's record since that time has also been very imposing and a sharp main go is anticipated.

Gibraltar Strait Swimmer Gives Up

TANGHER, Morocco, Dec. 15 (AP)—Miss Mercedes Gietz, London typist, abandoned her attempt to swim the strait of Gibraltar today. She started from the mouth of the Tago river at 2:30 p. m.

The woman swimmer had swum more than half of the 7 miles which she estimated would be the longest of her swim when she became seasick and was forced to give up.

While Miss Gietz was battling with the shark-infested waters of the strait her rival, Miss Millicent Hudson, who at one time was threatening to jump in and make a race of it, remained apparently indifferent toward Miss Gietz's effort. Miss Hudson's only activity was to go for her usual morning swim.

MICHIGAN DOPED TO WIN IN BIG 10

Court Teams Start Race Jan. 7—Purdue and Indiana Also Strong

CHICAGO (AP)—Two new coaches and the return of many of last year's stars enliven the Western Conference basketball season, now moving through the practice schedule in preparation for the opening Big Ten games starting January 7.

Dave McMillan, former coach of the University of Idaho, where he made a brilliant record, has taken charge of the Minnesota five and Arthur Lomborg from Washburn College, Topeka, Kan., is at Northwestern.

The Gophers are hoping for better things with their new coach, and the Minnesota squad gives promise of power. Six football men have joined the three court veterans on the squad, which is captained by Mally Nydahl, half back on the eleven.

At Idaho, McMillan won two Pacific Coast conference titles and his teams were runners-up five times. Minnesota is hopeful for a return to the court prestige enjoyed years ago under Dr. L. C. Cooke.

Michigan, Purdue and Indiana, which finished the 1926-27 season in that order, seem to have the rail for top positions again this year.

Five of Purdue's last year's varsity, led by Cummins, the high point scorer of the conference, give Coach Ward Lambert a promising start. For the preliminary games, Lambert planned double-enders, an innovation in conference rivalry to get a line on all his material.

Oosterbaan and Harrigan, the champion passing pair of the conference, are back in the ranks again at Michigan, which seems to have lost but little of the power that carried it through to a championship last winter. The Wolverines all are adepts at or better.

Indiana is not in such good shape, having lost most of its lettermen.

Lomborg begins his Big Ten court career under a handicap at Northwestern, for virtually all lettermen are out of the running there. Northwestern still has Walter Fisher for center, if football injuries have not incapacitated him.

Some of the best brains of the Rue de la Paix, the brilliant change of the fashion world, have been busy to make the evening jacket the bright, successful garment it is today. Cheruit, Jenny, Fremet, Lanvin, Worth, all took a hand in the creation of irrefutable forms of this style with the result that the jacket, often called a "smoking" in Paris, is now one of the most brilliant phases of the style.

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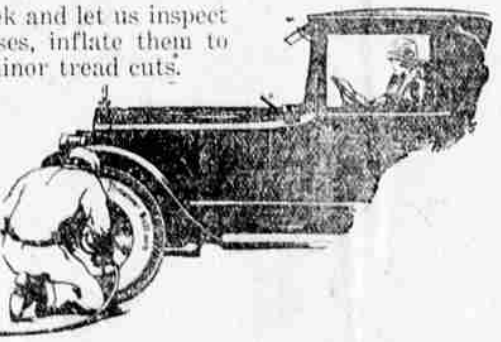
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
