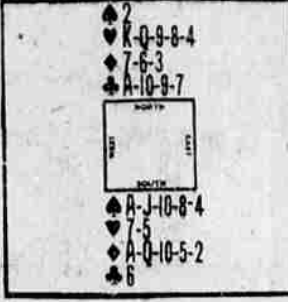

Bridge Pointers

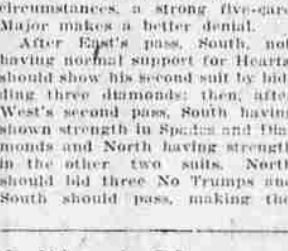
Yesterday we gave the twenty-six cards of the Dealer and his partner and asked how those two players should bid, supposing that the opponents passed whenever it was their turn to declare. Score below.



South (Dealer) should open the auction by bidding one Spade. He has what is known as a two-suitor (i. e., two suits of five cards each, both strong enough to bid). One suit is headed by A-J-10 and the other by A-Q-10; each therefore contains better than a quick trick and the hand contains better than the two quick tricks which are essential for an initial bid. South should bid the Spades, it being the higher-valued of his two suits, although the Diamonds are a little stronger. With two suits of practically the same strength, the manner valued should be called first.

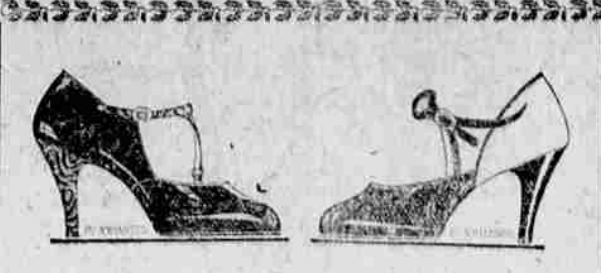
After West's pass, North not having normal support (three cards or two of which the Ace or King is one) for his partner's suit (Spades) and consequently wishing to deny it, and having length and strength in the other Major, should bid two Hearts. Despite his strength in Clubs, North should not bid No Trump because of his defenseless Diamonds. Under such circumstances, a strong five-card Major makes a better denial.

After East's pass, South, not having normal support for Hearts, should show his second suit by bidding three diamonds; then, after West's second pass, South having shown strength in Spades and Diamonds and North having strength in the other two suits, North should bid three No Trumps and South should pass, making the contract three No Trumps.

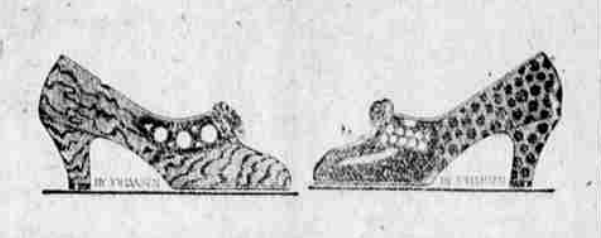

BREAKFAST—Shaved dried peaches, boiled rice, cream, broiled soft codfish, corn bread, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Baked oysters, shredded cabbage with lemon and oil, rice rolls, canned pears, bran flakes, milk, tea.
DINNER—Ham baked in milk, prime baked sweet potatoes, creamed spinach, new onions and mushrooms, green apple pie, milk, coffee.

If a hot bread is served for breakfast do not repeat the cereal grain in the bread. For instance, if a wheat cereal is used do not make Graham or bran muffins.

Baked Oysters
Remove solid part oysters, 1 egg, Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 cup minced celery and parsley, fine sifted cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup coarse buttered
