INSECTS FIGHT WEEDS
LONDON (AP)—Several divisions of insect shock troops are to be rushed to New Zealand to help farmers there to fight the fast spreading rag-weed which is destroying fruit crops.

British scientists have been making tests at Herpenden research station to find out which insects, beetles and caterpillars have the biggest appetite for the obnoxious weed.

An insect pest often found in gardens stored in the attic, such as books, magazines, and even clothing, is the "silverfish." These insects are attracted by starch in the bindings and garments. Bait the silverfish with a paste made of about a teaspoon of powdered white arsenic to a half a cup of flour and some boiling water. Spread the paste on small pieces of cardboard and place it where the insects have been found. Make sure the baits are placed where children will not touch them, and destroy after using.

"13th Juror" Now Showing At The Arcade

The age of miracles has not yet passed.
 If you doubt this statement go to the Arcade Theater today as Thursday shows "The Thirteenth Juror". A Universal Jewel production is hobbling the screen, and see Francis X. Bushman, the dean of all motion picture stars, who appears not a day over thirty.

How he does it no one seems to know, but to see him playing opposite the entrancing Anna Q. Nilsson, is enough to knock all the other so-called younger leading men into a cocked hat. Farm Pointers

Many cherry trees, especially in young orchards, were practically decolorated in Oregon last season by the purple and cherry slug. The small shiny green worms usually feed on the underside of the leaves. Thorough cultivation in the fall or nearly spring will destroy many of the slugs cocoons in the ground. A spray containing lead arsenate, two pounds, and hydrated lime, two pounds, to the 100 gallons of water will control this pest after it makes its appearance on the leaves, says the experiment station.

It is extremely important that alfalfa and red clover seed be tested for purity. Many samples of legume seed-carry dodder, last spring 22 per cent of the alfalfa seed samples tested at the Oregon experiment station laboratory contained dodder, a parasitic plant which practically ruins the yield of either alfalfa or red clover.

While pruning of fruit trees, the worker needs to keep a sharp lookout for the white flat egg clusters of the tussock moth and the smooth black tiny encircling clusters of the tent caterpillars. Clusters should be removed and killed by putting them in a can of kerosene or by burning. A little vigilance at this time may save injury to the trees next spring and may also save the cost of a spray application.

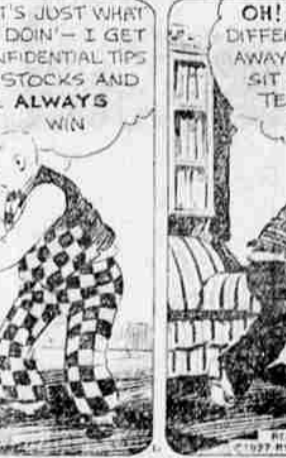
