Movies Libelous, Frenchmen Avers

PARIS (AP)—French motion picture men think there are too many French villains and French vamps in American pictures. They have asked American film companies to stop holding their nation up to world scorn, and they suggest that the French ministry of foreign affairs do something about it.

The French Syndicate of Cinematograph directors has adopted a four resolution declaring it "century to common sense and common courtesy always to present to the world the Frenchman as a being totally without morals and the Frenchwoman as a plaything."

Exception also is taken to presenting the French army in an unfavorable light or picturing the Foreign Legion as "a band of convicts and adventurers."

All these things are charged particularly against the films of the United States, but critics comment that French films take the same sort of liberty with the English, South American, Yugoslian and other peoples, each nation using its neighbors to represent vice and its own folk to typify virtue.

HEALTH

GOTTER By Charles Calvin Tiffin, M. D., Seattle, Wash.

All too often we fail to grasp the real vital truth in many subjects commanding our interest. This is particularly true where we invest ourselves in the problem having to do with the commonities of good health.

Take for instance the subject of gotter. Most of us, upon hearing or reading of this subject, immediately think of a large neck or something we have read regarding iodine or possibly of an "iodine" gotter so-called, or an "iodine" gotter so-called, which is visible. As a matter of fact all gotters are inside the neck either wholly or partly so.

The large irregularly shaped gotters, which we see in grown people, probably were there when the individual was born, but probably did not begin to grow large enough to be noticed until puberty.

This kind of gotter cannot be cured by medicine but can be prevented by the proper use of iodine if the iodine is taken by the mother before the child is born and if carefully used by the family physician while the child is growing. Women and men who have these large irregularly shaped gotters cannot take iodine safely and should consult their family physician.

The exophthalmic gotter does not show much in the neck. It usually comes in people averaging 35 years of age who have never had gotters before. It begins to make the person nervous and in a short time much weight has been lost. With this nervousness comes shortness of breath, sweating, increased appetite, rapid and pounding heart, weakness in the legs, and loss of

strength, loss of sleep, tendency toward crying, etc., etc.

There is still another kind of gotter where the neck is smooth and round, soft and large, which is the so-called colloid gotter occurring in children and some adults. It can be cured with the careful use of iodine or thyroid tablets.

No gotter, however, should be treated by yourself. Go to your family physician. He will know what kind you have and what should be done to get rid of it.
