Girl Races Train In Picture At Colonial

The successful race of a fearless motorist against a fast transcontinental express train through the snows, floods and landslides of eight states is the thrilling situation in Priscilla Dean's new Metro-politan star picture "The Speeding Venus" which will be the big feature at the Colonial today and Wednesday.

Chaney Picture, "Frisco Follies," Come To Arcade

"Serenade" Gives Menjou Fans His Best Picture
