Double Bill
At Star Today
And Friday

An outdoor picture in every sense of the word may be truly said of "Ranger of the North", the current PBO attractions starring Ranger at the Star theater today and Friday as one of the feature pictures on the double feature bill. Virginia Browne Faire, playing the part of the village basket-seller in a restaurant, is a lovely and sympathetic heroine. Then Warner Richmond of "The Fire Brigade" and "Slide, Kelly Slide" fame does a fine bit of comedy as a rough-neck miner.

The picture, while written on the theme of mother-love, has many exciting moments, as in the great final scene of the mine disaster, the football sequence, or the earlier scenes of the mine.

In the cast are George Nichols, Brooks Bonedick, Rose Blossom and Rosemary Cooper. "White Flannels" is one of the very best melodramas of the season, splendidly directed by Lloyd Bacon, who is coming to the forefront of American directors.

Coming As
'Flaming' Youths

A new angle has been placed on flaming youth. When the two words "flaming" and "youth" are placed side by side the impression usually gained by the motion picture fan is of rolled-stockings flappers and balloon-trotter youth with wine-kissed lips, dancing until morning.

But the "flame" has now jumped from the big city and the college campus to a one-horse town in the middle-west. And the age has been extended from the "teens" to the "late forties."

Paramount does the trick in its latest laughing picture "Two Flaming Youths" which will be shown at the Arcade theater Friday and Saturday.

The two "youths" are those two mustached comedians, W. C. Fields and Chester Conklin, who have at last been brought together after numerous individual screen and stage hits to work as a team at laugh-production.

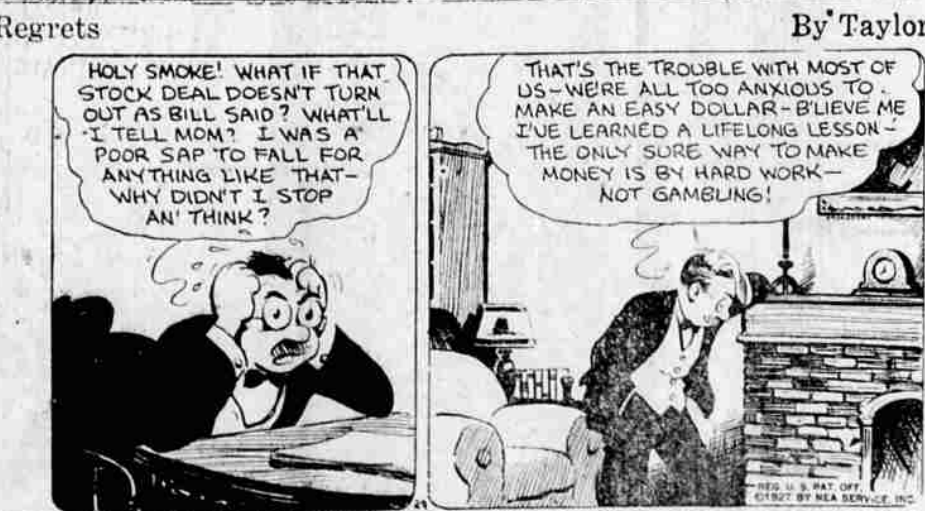
