Pork Makes Up A Half of Meat Diet of Nation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Approximately 50 per cent of the entire meat dietary in the United States is composed of pork. Investigations by the department of agriculture reveal.

Figures dating back to 1907 show that the per capita consumption of beef exceeded that of pork until 1912, when pork took a very slight lead. Until 1917 it increased that lead; then the war period advanced beef again, and it was not until 1921 that pork regained its supremacy.

There has been very little change in the amount of veal, mutton and lamb consumed in the last 20 years.

The unusual prominence of pork and its products in the American diet is traced to a number of stimulating factors. Intriguing control of hog cholera, swine parasites and other losses has made pork production a much safer enterprise than formerly. There was an increase of more than 2,000,000 hogs slaughtered under federal inspection during the last fiscal year as compared with the previous year. The total federal inspected hog slaughter last year exceeded 42,500,000 out of a total of approximately 70,000,000 food animals.

In addition to former investigations showing the high nutritive value of pork products to enhance the food value of cereal and vegetable products consumed at the same time, recent studies show pure pork sausage to have an exceptionally high fat value, providing more than 2000 calories a pound. This is approximately twice the number of calories ordinarily consumed by the average person at one meal.
