EXPECT \$3,000 REWARD

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 31 (AP)—Klamath authorities appealed to the Associated Press this morning to broadcast the description of the murderer of John Ansell, Klamath pioneer, who was murdered this morning in the Klamath Gun store by a safe robber. Already a \$100 cash reward has been offered for his capture.

The sheriff's office announced that the man was between five feet four and five inches tall; wore a black slouch hat pulled well down over his forehead; was sharp faced and slightly dark. When last seen he was wearing a red and black minkie. He is believed to be a man between 25 and 40 years of age, smooth faced, but in need of a shave at the time of the killing. He had a 45 caliber revolver in his possession and several hundred dollars in money and checks.

"So great is the popular indignation at this murder that the reward will probably be raised to \$3,000 before the day is over," Sheriff Hawkins said today.

To Appeal Case

Tuttle said the dismantling of the club was carried out under section 3453 of the revised statutes. He added that he was convinced this section authorized the confiscation of property.

J. Arthur Adler, counsel for Miss Morgan and eight employees of the club, who were arrested, denounced the raid as a violation of the process and search and seizure clause of the constitution and said he would carry the case to the United States supreme court.

Hold Dr. McMillen On Murder Charge

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 31 (AP)—Dr. Charles McMillen, 56-year-old physician, today was formally charged with suspicion of the slaying of Mrs. Amelia Appleby widow of John P. Appleby, a Chicago doctor who was killed in a fire declared valued at a million dollars when he died in 1918.

The physician, who clings to his one unchanging statement "I did not kill her," today was brought to the county jail from a cell in the Beverly Hill hotel where he had been held since his arrest Thursday. An attorney was retained by Dr. McMillen's estranged wife to defend him.
