While we are busy making resolutions for the year it is well to take stock of our health assets and determine just what we should do to insure our personal health happiness and prosperity in the twelve months just ahead of us.

Gilbert Film Opens At Star Tuesday

Interesting details of how Uncle Sam holds a job in city manner are contained in the trial scenes, person episodes, and other details of John Gilbert's new Metro-Goldwyn Mayer starring vehicle, "Man, Woman and Sin" coming Tuesday to the Star theater for a three-day run. In the new story, a romance of a newspaper life lived partly in Washington, the mechanics by which Washington and the District of Columbia are governed is a rickety show.

Washington is the only American city without a mayor, city council, and without any city politics. It is governed by a federal commission appointed by the president, and known as the District of Columbia Commission, and police, street department, fire department and all other details of operation of the city come under this body. Taxes are assessed, police needs appointed, and ordinances made by the commission.

These details come out in the scenes where Gilbert, as the reporter-hero of the new picture, is arrested, imprisoned and tried for a murder, later to be proven innocent in the story. The courts in which he appears, while passing on superior court cases, are presided over by federal judges. Even police court cases are under federal jurisdiction through the operation of the city that is not a city. Civil service governs all city officers, and the chief of police is an army officer, usually assigned to the task.

Gilbert's new vehicle is a striking story of a newspaper reporter's adventures in Washington, directed by Monta Bell, himself a former Washington newspaperman, who is also author of the story. The cast includes Jeanne Hagels, famous stage star of "Hats" in the leading female role as the society editor of the newspaper, and Marc McDermott, Hayden Stevenson, Cosmo Kyrle Bellw, Charles K. French, Gladys Brockwell, and others of note.

Buster Keaton's "College" At Arcade

Audience at the Arcade theater for the next three days will get a hilarious new angle on what happens behind the scenes in our leading educational institution. The great athletes in "College" include Bud Houser, Olympic winner of the shotput and discus; Leo Barness, world's champion polo player; Kenneth Gramble, national intercollegiate low hurdles champion; Leighton Dye, national intercollegiate high hurdles champion; Charles Borah, who shares with Charles Faddock the honor of being the "world's fastest human" having run the 100 yard dash in nine and one-half seconds; Morton Koster, all-American halfback, low hurdler, broad jump and javelin star; Sam Crawford, former professional baseball "ace" and nearly a score of crack oarsmen who have rowed on crack varsity crews at Yale, Columbia, Cornell, California, Washington, Syracuse and other leading universities.
