MENUS

- By Sister Mary
- BREAKFAST—Stewed figs, cereal, cream, omelette, crisp griddle toast, cornmeal pancakes, syrup, milk, coffee.
- LUNCHEON—Scalloped oysters, cabbage and orange salad, brown Betty, milk, tea.
- DINNER—Baked mutton, mashed potatoes, turnips in lemon sauce, pear and peanut butter salad, canned cherries, chocolate cake, milk, coffee.
- Winter root vegetables are rich in mineral salts and add bulk to the winter diet that is rich in protein and fat. Serve them frequently in place of out of season shipping vegetables. The change will make the latter vegetables more appreciated.
- Turnips in Lemon Sauce
- Three cups diced boiled turnips, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 egg yolk, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 tablespoon minced parsley.
- Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add water, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and boil five minutes. Remove from fire and stir in egg yolk slightly beaten. Add lemon juice and parsley and pour over hot freshly cooked and drained turnips. Serve at once.

After Wood's pass, North should bid two Spades. This bid is not made because of No Trump necessarily should be taken out with a five-card suit—even a strong one. No Trump is the shortest road to the goal (game) and should be overcalled with a Major only when the take-out bid will give the original bidder a valuable option between No Trump and the Major that is named. With Major suit weakness, the partner of the No Trump should pass; but this hand has amply sufficient strength to justify offering the option.

After East's pass, South would be thoroughly justified either in passing North's two Spades or bidding two No Trumps. As North's Spades were bid with strength (we are assuming that he is a sound bidder), the game probably can be made at either Spades or No Trump; but with two stoppers in each of the other suits, with a South hand which contains the ideal No Trump distribution, with the assurance that North has the Spades thoroughly taken care of and his assistance for the No Trump either in the Spades or on the side or both, a No Trump rebid by South would seem to promise

more profitable results than a pass. North should pass South's two No Trumps.
