EGG PRICES ARE UP MUCH HIGHER

All Grades Advancing, Jump Ranges from 2 1/2 to 4 Cents a Dozen

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3 (AP)—Egg prices are considerably higher on the dairy exchange board here today, occasioned by weather conditions. All grades were advanced at the exchange meeting yesterday, results ranging from 2 1/2 to 4 cents a dozen. Quotations are as follows: Standard extra, 37c; standard firsts, 35c; medium extra, 33c; medium firsts, 32c; and undersized, 30c.

Nothing is coming in to the local wholesale poultry market and prices are decidedly firm. All classes cleaned up well during the holidays and it is expected that prices will rise in all divisions unless shipments pick up materially today. Heavy hens are exceptionally scarce but demand this morning was quite light.

Country dressed meats are quoted steady at Saturday's figures, although the market is practically cleaned out on whole stock. Veal is expected to be in good supply, but probably should today's receipts prove limited, obstruction of highways by the heavy snowfall has kept most of the early offerings out of the market. Supplies of hogs and lambs are also limited, although shortage is not acute as most dealers carried over considerable stock from last week.

Practically all the local markets are paralyzed to some extent, but weather conditions and price trends in the next few days will depend largely on how rapidly transportation conditions improve.

Wheat Unsettled But Higher Today
CHICAGO, Jan. 3 (AP)—Starting at 1/2 to 3/4c gain, Chicago wheat later showed an additional rise. Corn, oats and provisions were also firmer, corn opening 1/2 to 3/4c higher, but subsequently reacting somewhat.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/2 to 3/4c net higher; corn 1/2 to 3/4c off; oats unchanged to 1/4c down, and provisions unchanged to 1/2c decline.
