DINNER — Baked halibut steaks, potatoes au gratin, beef in orange sauce, steamed fig pudding, milk, coffee.

Scrub beets well. Cut off tops.

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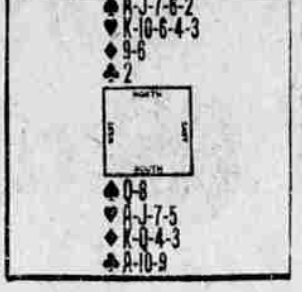
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Bridge Pointers

Yesterday we gave the twenty-six cards of a Dealer and his partner, and asked how those two players should declare, supposing that the opponents passed whenever it was their turn. The score was stated to be love-all, and the hands were:



THE ANSWER

South (Dealer), with three suits stopped, and an Ace and a Queen better than average, should bid one No Trump.

No one, with a Major two-suiter, can be thoroughly assured that it will be better to play the hand at the Major suit which fits the South hand than at No Trump. North therefore bids two Spades, the stronger of his two five-card Majors. If the Spade and Heart strength had been reversed, North would have bid the Hearts first.

South having only two Spades—but one of them the Queen—has a close choice between passing and a No Trump rebid. If he surely had the Clubs stopped twice, there would be no question—the two No Trumps would be much sounder, but with only one sure stopper in Clubs, the case is somewhat doubtful. However, South is so strong in both Hearts and Diamonds and needs so little in Clubs from North to stop the suit twice a Jack for instance, that two No Trumps seems to be advisable. South having only two Spades, it may be that one of the adversaries will turn up with four and that the No Trump will work better than the Spade.

North then should bid three Hearts. His Hearts are not strong; but he has five and his partner, by bidding and rebidding the No Trump, has twice shown strength in Hearts. With North's Hearts, it is a practical certainty that Hearts will work better than No Trump for the combined hands.

North's Hearts fit South's hand and, with the Clubs stopped only once, South should pass; it would leaving at least an inch of stem. Drop into boiling water and cook until tender. Winter beets will require at least two hours of steady cooking. Drain and sieve a cup of the water in which beets were cooked. Drop beets in cold water and slip off skins. Cut in round slices or tiny balls with a vegetable cutter. Pour over the following sauce:

Orange Sauce

One tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 4 tablespoons best liquor, 1 teaspoon grated orange rind, ½ cup orange juice, 4 tablespoons cream, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sugar.

Melt butter, stir in flour and slowly add beet water. Add grated rind, orange juice, cream, salt, pepper and sugar. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Add prepared beets and make very hot over hot water.

This is an excellent vegetable to serve when a meal must be kept hot for some time.

LIGHT WOOL FABRICS ARE SPRING PROPHECY

PARIS (AP)—The game style creators who launched the "be more feminine" movement which brought longer hair, bow-knots and ruffles back to favor now are determined to revive originality.

They see an element of danger to Parisian style prestige in the present uniformity of Paris models which Paul Poiret scornfully calls "sacks." The "sack" must go, says the Rue de la Paix.

Nothing seems to please the dressmakers more than to make women like something they first refuse. It's making clothes so full of ideas that women will find it impossible to resemble one another—unless they order duplicate models—the fashion makers hope to re-instate themselves as arbiters of the dressing table.

Jeanne Lanvin is a leader in this back-to-elegance and individuality movement. Another believer in a revival of originality is Mme. Boulanger, who confidently declares that nothing beautiful is impossible where women's clothes are concerned, and goes right on making modern converts to dresses of medieval inspiration. Paul Poiret never ceases to preach the need for originality and there are half a dozen others who are "avowedly enemies to conventional style."

Queen and Prince Send Big Wreaths

PARIS, Jan. 4 (AP)—A great wreath of roses and lilacs from Queen Marie and one from former Crown Prince Carol were among the mass of flowers at the Bier on Rue de la Paix, famous dancer, at a cremation ceremony today.

The famous dancer, who was born near Chicago, for many years had been a close friend and confidante of the queen of Rumania. Miss Fuller died Monday from pneumonia.

Prince Carol's tribute was tied with a ribbon of Rumanian colors inscribed "To a great friend of my country."

Constantine Diamandy, Rumanian minister to France, Prince Cantacuzene and a representative

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of ministers of education Herriot were among the mourners who included many French artists and American friends of the dancer.

The dancer's ashes were sealed in a stone urn and placed in the chapel, Niche of the crematory.
