HEALTH

SPUTUM BORNE DISEASES AND PERSONAL HYGIENE

Member Marcus Memorial Hygiene is the science of health. The word is derived from Hygieia, the daughter of Hippocrates, the father of medicine. The subject is a large one and even the topic, personal hygiene, is too large for discussion in limited space. It is destined to call your attention to health and ventilation in relation to sputum-borne diseases and personal hygiene.

We have known for a long time that certain diseases affecting the nose and throat, the mouth and lungs, are contagious and that they are carried to other persons living in close contact, as in the same room, and more directly by inhaling, in breathing the breath exhaled or floating droplets of secretions coughed and spit out by the person or persons so affected.

We have found out during recent years that some persons having had a disease such as diphtheria, or scarlet fever, although they have recovered from the physical effects of the disease, harbor the germs of the disease in the tonsils, or in the nose and throat or in accessory sinuses. What are accessory sinuses? Hollow spaces on the bones of the cheeks and the interior portion of the skull, lined with mucous membrane and communicating with the nasal passages.

The bran-like scales of persons recovering from a disease such as scarlet fever, contrary to an ancient belief, are not such a great menace; but the danger from a person having had the disease is another person coming in contact with him is that the convalescent, as he is, or may be, a disease carrier, that he may harbor the germs in the accessory sinuses, the nasal mucus membrane, or in the crypts of the tonsils, and that these germs may be and are discharged into the surrounding air, either by sneezing, coughing, or hawking, or indeed by ordinary breathing and in this way are a menace and a danger.

If germs are diluted with an abundance of fresh air, they largely lose their virulence, or their dangerous properties, for fresh air is one of the greatest antiseptics we have.

AT THE THEATERS

"Corporal Kate" Showing Last Time Today

Presenting for the first time on the screen, the women's side of the World War, or rather, the intrepid part played by American women in the great conflict, Verne Reynolds' new star picture, "Corporal Kate," created a profound impression on its premier showing at the Colonial theater yesterday. From every angle, this is a decidedly human, realistic romance of love and war, indubitably one of the best produced in many months showing for the last time today.

The story deals with a young man of wealth who is drawn into the war, and of two girls who go to the French front as entertainers. They do a sister dancing act at the canteens and both love the same man, Miss Reynolds and Julia Faye are the girls, while the man is Kenneth Thompson. There are many thrilling episodes as might be expected, and the action is packed with drama, action, thrills, and laughter. The scenes on the fighting line are vividly pictorial, and the dramatic moments, notably the German air raid, hold the spectator's interest on the keen edge of expectation to the final fade out. Indeed, the picture is quite worthwhile.

Miss Faye and Mr. Thompson, both of whom are featured, are admirable in their support of this sister star, whose portrayal of "Corporal Kate" is perhaps the best thing she has done since her elevation to stardom. Majed Coleman, the third of the three girl "buddies" is seen to fine advantage in an arduous role. The supporting cast is wholly adequate.

The story, written by Zella Sears and Marion Orth, was superbly directed under the direction of Paul Sloane.

From the cool patio, center of his hacienda, a Spanish don ruled a sun-drenched California rancho. Serene and peaceful, life flowed smoothly under his gentle guidance.

There was, however, one irritation for the old aristocrat. He could not get his nephew and heir to shoulder the responsibilities that were his. "You are but an indolent, egotistical playboy," the old man expostulated. But his words drew only shrugs and lazy smiles from the youth.

Life was too pleasant—why should he worry about administration of the rancho's affairs? Especially when he was busy wooing the American girl, whose father was commissioner for the United States in the newly acquired territory. That was youth's business.

But suddenly the peace was shattered. Crime and violence entered the life of the native Mexicans. Gold, discovered near the rancho, drew desperadoes and ruffians as huzzards to carnage. Thefts on the rancho. Pistol shots at night. Drunkenness in the village cantina. Violence and oppression to the natives. Finally, murder of the commissioner himself, with the crime charged against the innocent youth.

His home burned, his sweetheart turned against him, his people oppressed, his gold stolen, small wonder that the youth was transformed into a terrorizing, night-riding bandit—the savior of the people and missions and the scourge of the Americans. How he checked the Gringos' depredations, brought peace to the riot-

ous rancho and finally delivered the real murderer to justice to win back his girl is the thrill-packed climax of the youth's story.

Such is a sketch of the plot of "The Gay Defender," Richard Dix' new Paramount starring picture which comes to the Arcade theater Thursday for a three day stay. It portrays the youth, a character drawn from early California history and based on the colorful exploits of the Mexican bandit, Juanito Murietta. Thelma Todd is the American girl, and Fred Kohler, "wolf of the screen," the villainous American.

Gregory LaCava, director of "Womanhanded," "Let's Get Married" and several other of Dix' most successful pictures, held the megaphone on "The Gay Defender" an original screen story by Grover Jones. Ray S. Harris, Sam Mintz and Kenneth Babcock adapted it for the screen.

John Gilbert In Role Not Entirely Romantic

John Gilbert, romanticist of the screen, can also be a very practical young man—when he has to. Witness his portrayal of a reporter in "Man, Woman and Sin," his new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer starring vehicle at the Star theater today and Thursday.

He's a typical American youngster, who starts as a madding room boy in a newspaper, becomes a reporter—and only loses his practical angle when he falls in love—which after all is the most practical thing about the role. One does just that thing—when one is young and the girl is pretty—and Jeanne Eagles is all that. The new story is an ultra-modern romance laid in a newspaper office—in a big Washington daily. The thrill of news gathering in the national capital is embellished with a startling plot and a remarkable romance, in which Gilbert plays a role that shows another side of his extraordinary versatility.

Monta Bell, both author and director of the play, was himself once a newspaper man in Washington, hence his production has the echo of the man who knows his subject.

The audience is taken into a newspaper office and shown the whole business of publishing a paper, from gathering the news to printing it, in a series of scenes that are graphic and technically marvelous. A spectacular detail is a reproduction of the great Embassy Ball, largest social affair in America, staged on a gorgeous scale.

Gilbert plays an American youth who by sheer work rises from poverty to the position of a newspaper reporter on a big daily—and his first love affair is with the pretty society editor. A rife played by Jeanne Eagles, famous stage star of "Rain," who makes her screen debut in the picture. Miss Eagles' fame as an actress has long since been established; needless to say she plays her role with extreme artistry. Charles K. French is seen as the grouchy city editor, and Cosmo Kyrle Bellew, son of Kyrle Bellew, famous stage actor, plays the reporter "Muddy." Haydon Stevenson is also clever as a reporter and Marc McDermott plays the owner of the paper convincingly. Gladys Brockwell does a rare piece of acting as the mother of the hero, and little Philip plays the hero as a boy-looking ex-

actly like the Gilbert—enough to pass convincingly as the actor at the age of about ten.
